The return of the five cent rate and

A firm in St. John writing to
 parties interested in this city in-
 terested in a live sheep in this city say:
 "As you are no doubt aware during the
 past year there has been severe de-
 clines in the Wool markets. This
 condition of affairs has been univer-
 sal all over the world. At the London
 wool sales which opened on May
 2th, just past, Cross breeds similar
 to the wools grown in the Maritime
 Provinces declined from 10per cent to
 15 per cent further. This on top of
 the declines which have taken place
 at almost every sale during the past
 twelve months, makes the situation
 look a little serious and we would
 not be surprised to see our native
 wool touch lower figures than it is
 selling for to day. We would like to
 handle P. E. I. wool and can pay
 for white tub washed wool 16c., to
 18., a pound according to the
 quality, and for unwashed from
 10c. to 12c., a pound. These prices
 we could not guarantee on ac-
 count of the condition of the market
 they are subject to change. Last
 season there was a lot of very poorly
 washed wool on the market, and we
 would caution all about buying this
 class of stock this year, as it is
 worth from 2c., to 5c., a pound less
 than good wool."

There was baseball for everybody
 at Victoria Park yesterday afternoon,
 though no regular game was played.
 Most of the players were no doubt
 out of town, the football at New
 Glasgow—in which the Charlottetown
 Victorias were engaged being too
 much for the "sports" to resist.

There was unexpectedly removed by
 death on Saturday morning last, a
 citizen whose loss will be keenly felt
 and mourned by very many people
 of this Province—Donald McKenzie—
 a man well liked in the community
 of which he was a useful and intelli-
 gent member. He had been absent in
 the country the week previous and
 returned to his home in Charlotta-
 town not feeling well. During the
 next few days, under the care of the
 doctor he was apparently recovering,
 but on Saturday his strength sank
 rapidly and he passed away. He was
 a man who had during his lifetime
 been actively engaged in occupations
 that made him acquainted with the
 people of all sections of this Pro-
 vince and his friends were many. He
 was a man of a reserved disposition
 and very few knew that his mind was
 exceptionally well enriched by a life
 of careful reading, and that he was
 an accomplished and graceful writer
 his contributions on many subjects—
 particularly historical matters relat-
 ing to his native Province, having
 been frequently published and ac-
 cepted as authoritative, although he
 modestly preferred to have his con-
 tributions appear unsigned, or over
 a nom-de-plume. There survive him
 a widow and his sons, John, Donald,
 Arthur and Alexander, and his daugh-
 ter Miss Flora McKenzie of West
 Kent St. School. His surviving
 brothers and sisters are: John Mc-
 McKenzie of Roxbury, Mass.; Fred,
 McKenzie of Hartford, N.Y.; Mrs.
 Henry Lawson, of Victoria, B.C.;
 and Mrs. Murray of this Province.
 The Guardian in voicing the loss the
 Province has sustained by his re-
 moval, begs respectfully to extend
 sympathy to his sorrowing family.
