University Team Wins Opener 6-3

A Converted Penalty Kick By The Saints Proves Abbie Undoing On Saturday.

Saint Dunstan's defeated the Abbies Saturday by a 6-to-3 score in the opening game of the Provincial Senior Football League. It was a hectic struggle between two evenly matched teams with the play waging back and forth as the squads bucked and dribbled to gain ground. Some good long kicks, with startling runs by backfield men featured the play, while costly fumbles and wild passes marred the otherwise brilliant tussle. The Saints proved themselves the better coached and better conditioned team, and were quick to take advantage of opportunities. In the scrum, no one team had the advantage in the first half, but in the second, the Saints' scrum appeared to dominate, getting the ball out clean, and snapping it back to a smooth working backfield. The teams used different scrum formations, the Saints favoring the two-three-two, and the Abbies the three-two-three. The Abbies were forced to make some hard tackles to check the onrush of the Collegians and more than once prevented tries by steady bucking at the five yard line. For the Saints Duffy, MacMillan, O'Connor, Coyle and Arsenal played brilliant rugby. Fairridge, Hunter, Saunders, Woolner and Shaw were the pick of the losers. MacMillan's beautiful forty yard penalty kick about the middle of the first half, opened the scoring for the Saints, after the battle had waged fruitlessly back and forth. The Abbies fought hard to negotiate a try and were in fair chance of realizing when the whistle blew for half time. The second half began with the Abbies kicking off. The Saints returned the kick and followed rapidly into Abbie territory, driving the City team back to the thirty yard line. The Abbies half line fielded the ball and instead of punting, tried a passing game with the result that a costly fumble gave Duffy, fast University three quarter an opportunity not to be lost. Striking from his position he scooped up the loose ball, eluded a would-be tackler and planted the ball squarely between the uprights, all of which happened within a minute of the opening of the last half. The try was unconverted, but left the Saints with a 6-to-0 lead. The Abbies worked hard to penetrate the ranks of the college squad, but were driven back by brilliant punts and runs by O'Connor, the "mighty atom" of the Saints. About the middle of the half the Abbies managed to punt the ball in touch on the Saints' five yard line, and in a scrum, the ball came out cleanly to Hunter, picking quarter, who went over for the Abbies' only score. "Hib" Saunders failed to convert from a difficult angle. The game as a whole was a good one to watch. The Saints' three-quarter line worked like a machine with snappy passing, and long punts for substantial gains. The Abbies on the other hand at no time appeared capable of making an organized effort. The forwards on the whole were slow in following, and breaking through, while the backs showed poor judgment in passing and kicking. "Sap" Duffy was the hero of the game, as he led the back field in fierce onslaughts, kicked very effectively, and scored the Saints' second count. Saint John May Have Two Hockey Teams

SAINT JOHN, Oct. 23.—Announcement that The Forum Ltd., intends to start upon immediate construction of a local model ice arena, was followed later by one from those vitally concerned in hockey—that Saint John would be represented in senior hockey this winter. There is a likelihood of two senior sextets here, it was learned from authentic sources. There are a number of puck-chasers still in Saint John who in other years wore the spangles of the home club, both as Fusiliers and finally as Beavers. The majority of these men are available for renewal of the winter game, it is believed by those closely connected with the sport when hockey flourished in this city. The old Saint John Hockey Club (Beavers) has disbanded, but officials, having previous connections with that organization, have commented on the situation. They say no doubt immediate action will be taken to build up a team for the coming season. At the time the old Arena burned, out-of-town clubs rallied to the locals' aid and co-operated well with the attempt to keep hockey alive here, it was added. They believe all possible assistance will again be forthcoming from the outside sixes. Nearby clubs, namely, Sussex, Fredericton and maybe one of the Moncton groups, will be interested in the developments here this week, one former puck official said. He intimated that it might mean formation of a new league, possibly reorganization of the old Southern New Brunswick section. For some time past it has been understood that the Trojans have had an eye toward hockey and several of their members are considered splendid players. The Tigers, intermediate champions of this district a year ago, are ready to turn senior and reported last night they could name a list of better-than-average puckmen who would be willing to wear their togs. Former Beavers still residents here are: Aldie Clark, Todd Thomson, Frank Killey, Chick Keating, Sonny Andrews and Jack Burke.

Building Safe

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—All fear, for the safety of the Chateau de Rameray, expressed by the Numismatic and Historical Society early this summer when digging of a tunnel under Montreal's oldest museum was commenced, has been dispelled. In fact the building is in better condition than ever, city engineers believe. The propping up of the walls as a precaution to protect the structure has had the effect of closing up bad fissures and raising the whole building to its original level. RUGBY NOTES

Though not addicted to "picking winners," a not new but still popular pastime, the writer was not at all surprised at the result of the Abbies-S. D. U. game Saturday afternoon. As might be expected St. Dunstan's showed vast improvement over their first appearance on Thanksgiving Day. They merited victory, as much as the Abbies deserved defeat. The Red and Black clan can count itself extremely fortunate that a much more one-sided score was not chalked up against it. The Saints were not "just lucky," as some person suggested. They were ready to take advantage of the "breaks," when such came their way; witness Duffy's heady try, when he scooped up a loose ball while in scoring position. The team that is ready to take the "breaks" is the winning team every time.

The unexpected occurred Saturday afternoon when Dalhousie defeated the Wanderers 3-0 at Halifax. The Tigers thus far this season failed to show the winning punch either in exhibition or league games. It is possible that the Dalhousians may still figure in the Maritimes this year.

An unprejudiced analysis of the game played Saturday afternoon, as one scribe saw it more or less intently, reveals the fact that the Red and White team has a healthy balance on the credit side of their ledger, while the Abbies' sheet indicates "bad business," though prospects for improvement are good.

The Saints have a fast breaking scrum, capable of excellent heeling. The forwards follow well, are exceptionally strong in line-outs, and open scrumage work, and get the ball out to their backs at all costs. The halves and quarters use their heads as well as their feet, and with unerring judgment punt or pass as the situation demands, though in their passing game their efforts to gain territory seem to be fruitless. The team as a whole is in excellent condition, gives evidence in every play of careful coaching, and what is of paramount importance is in the play as a unit at all times, with every player tackling well. As regards the Abbies, the outstanding feature of the team in general is lack of conditioning and absence of anything that resembles team play. Poor judgment in kicking and passing arising from lack of organized practice is also noticeable. The forwards in the open scrummages instead of heeling have the habit of kicking the ball ahead to the S. D. U. backs, thus permitting the latter to punt to advantage. The batting of the ball in the line-outs, and the leaving of opponents unguarded is also noticeable. Following up and breaking through are almost entirely absent. The backs seem slow getting away, pass inaccurately, and do not kick advantageously. While on the defensive the tendency to wait for the opposing line instead of charging is costly. The team tackles hard, although at times too high, and a few individual dribbles net gains. The above analysis accounts for the S. D. U. victory and for the fact that the play was in Abbie territory for ninety per cent of the time. Will Practice The determination to "get down to business" was voiced unanimously by the Abegweit ruggers following their defeat Saturday. Organized workouts will be held henceforth, with the object of getting into shape and developing team play. 5 o'clock sharp is the hour today.
