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FRANCE WANTS DIRIGIBLE LIKE ZR-3 The Proposal to Build One Goes Before Reparations Commission.

DISCUSS ISLAND GRIEVANCES WITH RAILWAY COMMISSION Commissioner Lawrence Unable to be Present Through Illness.—Winter Service, Freight Rates, and Local Train Service Among Questions Placed Before Board.



PREPARED CROWS NEST REPORT

(Special to Guardian) PARIS, Oct. 19.—A scheme which would postpone the dismantling of the Zeppelin works at Friedrichshafen, Germany, for at least two years, and by which the construction of another giant dirigible, similar to the ZR-3, which was delivered to the United States by a trans-Atlantic flight this week would be made possible, is described in Le Journal today.

The Canadian Board of Railway Commissioners arrived in the city Saturday morning in their special car and were met at the station by Hon. Dr. MacMillan and Hon. J. A. MacDonald, who escorted them to the Provincial Building where the sitting opened at 10:30 with Judge McKeown presiding. He was accompanied by Commissioner Spencer Mr. Lawrence the third commissioner being unable to attend on account of illness.

Eminent British Naval Authority Dies

Mr. E. T. Higge, after expressing his great pleasure, as a citizen of the Maritime Provinces, in learning that the Dominion Government had passed such good judgment in appointing so fair minded and able a jurist as his Lordship to the important position of Chairman of the Railway Commission and welcoming the Board to Prince Edward Island, drew its attention to the fact that the freight rates on certain chemicals shipped from Syracuse, N. Y., to Charlottetown and other island points, showed unfair discrimination against this Province.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 19.—Admiral Sir Percy Scott, noted naval authority, is dead in his 72nd year.

He submitted a statement of rates which showed that though the mileage to Halifax was greater than to Charlottetown the rates on this commodity to the latter place were much higher than those applying to Halifax. It was only right that this city be placed in the same class as Halifax and that a re-adjustment be made with- out delay, so that immediate shipments would receive the benefit of the reduction.

Chinese Airmen Sink Warships

Mr. Nelson Rattenbury introduced the subject of the continuation to Pownal Street of the Lower Water railway spur. There were four important wharves along this section of Charlottetown's waterfront that should have rail connection. For the wholesalers of the vicinity it would mean a great saving in truckage. Some years ago the rails had been extended across Prince and Great George streets and the trouble in the present instance, seemed to be that the railway was asking the city for guarantees in the matter of rights of way. The City of Charlottetown however, and private property owners, were willing to give sanction and approval to the use of street and property as a right of way.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 19.—Airplanes belonging to the forces of Chang-Tso-Lin, the Manchurian War Lord, Thursday sank two Government warships at Chinwangtao, an important port in the Province Chihli on the Gulf of Lisutung, according to a despatch to the Daily Mail from Mukden.

General Wu Pei-Fu, commander of the Chihli forces, had his headquarters aboard a battleship at Chinwangtao and thirty of Chang's planes were sent to attack the harbor in an endeavor to ascertain which ship General Wu was on. The despatch adds that the ships put to sea but two were struck with bombs and exploded and sunk in flames.

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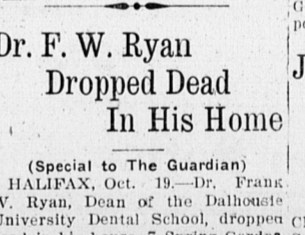
Writs Issued for Nfld. Newspaper Editors
