START NEW YEAR WITH HIGHER WAGES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—More than 20,000 building mechanics in this city will start the new year with increases in wages, according to announcement made last night by the building trades employers association. About 12,000 bricklayers will receive an advance from \$5.60 to \$6 a day. About 5,500 stone setters will have their wages advanced to the same figures, 3,000 composition roofers will receive an increase from \$3.25 to \$3.50 a day, about 3,000 electrical workers will get an advance from \$4.50 to \$4.80 a day.

The \$6 a day to be paid to the bricklayers and stonemasons is the highest rate ever paid to journeymen in these trades in New York and anywhere in the United States.
