PONZI WON'T ADMIT GIVING NOTE FOR HOME. Cross-Examined in Action to Set Aside Purchase.

BOSTON, June 15.—The action brought in the Federal Court by the trustees of the bankrupt estate of Charles Ponzi to set aside the purchase of the Lexington home of the former financier from Richard Engstrom for which Ponzi paid \$20,000, was concluded yesterday afternoon with arguments by counsel.

Ponzi was on the stand again yesterday for cross-examination by Attorney Rogers. He stated that after he took the Lexington house he spent \$5,000 in equipping it for gas and making repairs. He was asked if a note was given when the deed was passed. This question opened up again the rights of Ponzi and the court was asked to decide on the admissibility of the question. Attorney McIsaac, for Ponzi, maintaining that Ponzi took money for investment in foreign exchange, international coupons, bonds, etc., and to admit that some of it went to purchase a house would be used against him in the fraud charges preferred against him in the state courts.

Ponzi was directed to answer and he replied "no." He would not admit that a "negotiable instrument" had been given. He said the "note" was not given by him and was not a part of the consideration.

Miss Teresa King, stenographer for trustee Sears, read from her notes a statement made by Ponzi to trustee Sears, in which he said: "I agreed to buy the house for \$20,000, and to make him more satisfied, I gave him a chance to make \$10,000 by investing with me."

Ponzi, questioned regarding the Securities Exchange note bearing the name of Mr. Engstrom as payee, denied he handed the note to Attorney Thompson, who was acting for Engstrom and did not know how it was delivered. Ponzi was then excused.

Experts on real estate were called both for the trustees and for Engstrom. Various estimates of the value of the estate were given, and the general opinion was that the replacement value is much greater than the property is valued at.

Mrs. Annie L. Engstrom, wife of the former owner of the property, testified to signing the deed, but denied seeing the Ponzi note or hearing anything said about it at the time the deed was passed.

STARTED IN LIFE AS CLERK IN LIVERPOOL Has Given Nearly \$6,000,000 to Medical Work.

Sir Ernest Cassel, who has given a million dollars for the founding of a hospital for nerves, is one of the richest individuals in the United Kingdom, and also one of the most generous, for he has given nearly \$6,000,000 to medical work, besides large sums for other charitable purposes. Of German birth, but a naturalized Englishman, he has been the intimate friend of kings and statesmen. Yet in his early days he earned but a few dollars a week as a clerk in Liverpool. Then he entered a London financial house, and before he was thirty he had established a reputation as a successful financier. He controls banks and railways and many big industrial concerns. He was also who furnished the financial backing for the building of the great Niagara dams. Sir Ernest was an intimate friend of King Edward, to whom he bore such a striking resemblance that he became known among his friends as "Windsor Castle."

MESSAGE FROM KING Sends Greetings to Association of Rotary Clubs

EDINBURGH, Scotland, June 17.—The King has sent a message to the International Association of Rotary Clubs now in session here, expressing his thanks for the greetings of the association and also confidence that the deliberations will prove of material benefit to the countries represented. The French delegates have invited the United States delegates to visit Paris for the fourth of July celebration. Among the subjects discussed today were educational publicity and the application of the Rotary ideal to business methods. Vocational openings and other work for boys were strongly urged as part of Rotarian activity.

'HOTEL RATS' CHIEF KNOWN IN PARIS

PARIS, June 17.—The French police believe they have learned at last the identity of the chief of a band of European "Hotel Rats," who for a number of months have been committing a series of garish jewel robberies from guests at the fashionable hotels in Paris and on the Riviera. The man under strong suspicion is a Spaniard named Fernandez. It is believed he is responsible for the theft of jewels worth 250,000 francs from a rich Englishman at the Hotel Claridge here last week. The police also believe that Fernandez was the master mind, if not the actual perpetrator, of a number of robberies at hotels in Nice and Mentone.

In Nice a pearl necklace valued at 900,000 francs was stolen from Signor Mayoto, an attaché of the Peruvian legation. A man answering the description of Fernandez was seen coming out of the Claridge by side door soon before the wealthy Englishman returned.

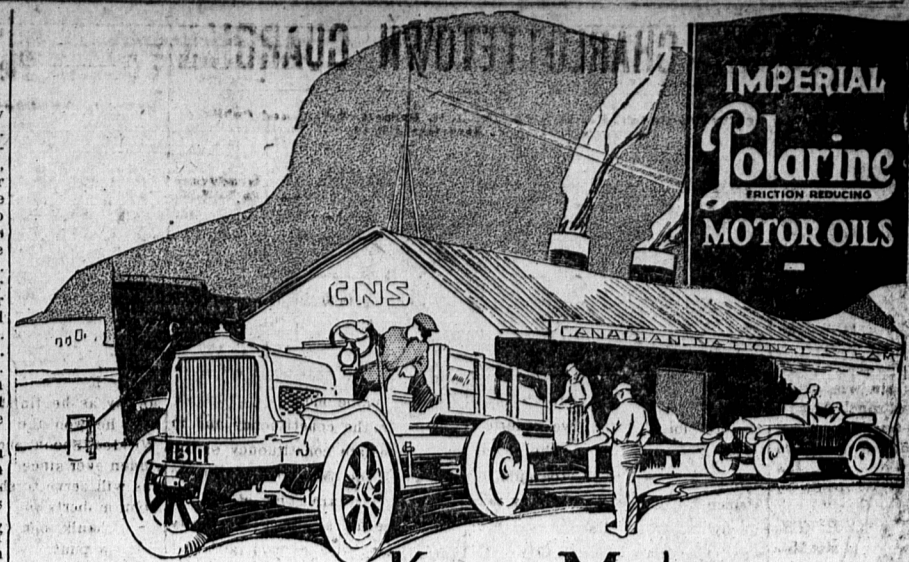
