Skidders are taking advantage of the large snowfall, and are out in all their clearing-filling colorful regalia, stemming down covered slopes, and hiking cross-country. It is unfortunate that some slope has not been cleared on which the kiddies could ride their sleighs, rather than coasting on the main highway hills in danger of their lives from passing vehicles. It is almost impossible for any automobile to stop when there appears in front a youngster coasting on a sled. Many motorists have already had a narrow escape from killing a child, owing almost totally to good luck and quick action. On one occasion the boy was resting against the front wheels of the car before it was brought to a stop while climbing a hill. Only the quick action of this driver saved the youngster from sure death. This is a problem which should be taken under immediate consideration before some youngster is killed. Up to the present we have been fortunate enough to have escaped a tragedy, and it is sincerely hoped that no accidents will occur. However, in view of the fact that motorists are practically unable to stop on the highway, some other hill might be found for coasting purposes reducing the accident factor to an almost negligible amount.
