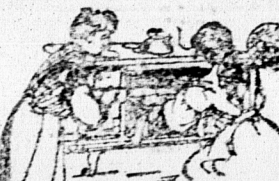

LAURIER AND BORDEN SHOULD COME.

We have practically two federal Premiers in Canada, one present, the other prospective, one the First Minister of the Dominion Cabinet at Ottawa, the other the First Minister of His Majesty's loyal Opposition. A generous country pays them both sundry thousands out of its overflowing treasury. It pays Sir Wilfrid for filling up from time to time, and presiding over a Cabinet of Ministers (which tends at times sadly to depletion) for communicating their advice to the Crown and for performing certain administrative functions. And it pays the Opposition Premier for his efforts to destroy public confidence in the said Cabinet, and to strip the Ministers of the glittering seals of office.

The point we wish to make is that each of these exalted and well-paid leaders ought at least once each year to visit every Province within their national jurisdiction. It is surely not too much to ask. It is good while since Sir Wilfrid Laurier has visited this Province, and for certain strong reason we think he ought to come and see us. Mr. Borden ought also to come for equally weighty reasons, but shows no sign of doing so. He has planned a tour of the Dominion from east to west, but strangely enough has omitted this Island, Province entirely from his program.

Sir Wilfrid ought to come and see us. Under his regime our Province has also lost somewhat of its population, and has also lost a portion of its representation in the Commons, and its representation in the Cabinet, of which in Sir Louis Davies political career we all were so proud. Sir Wilfrid ought to come and see us, if only to find out at first hand why the once large Liberal support from this Island has been cut down to one, who like a last rose of summer is left blooming alone in the Garden of the Gulf. Perchance he might find the curious fact in part explained by a memorable letter which he wrote some sixteen years ago intimating that a certain important work must be constructed if reasonably practicable, as a great many worthy Island people believe it is.

And Mr. Borden ought to come, if only out of gratitude to the one Province of the line which sent three-fourths of its total representation to support him at Ottawa. And yet, as we see, Mr. Borden as a great political luminary has arranged to pass over the Dominion, like the sun, from east to west, and shed his radiance over Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, but seems to have forgotten that there is such a Province as Prince Edward Island on the map. At least, like the priest and the Levite in the parable, he chooses to pass by on the other side.

Mr. Borden ought not to treat us Islanders in such cavalier fashion. It is his special business to advise the people. The Governor General will not take his advice, being constitutionally bound to take counsel from the Liberal Cabinet for the present. But the people are in no way restricted from taking Mr. Borden's advice, even if, as in duty bound, and as he is paid for doing, he should advise them to turn Sir Wilfrid and his old and new Ministers out of office. We want to know, and to learn from himself at first hand, the reasons why we should make so great and disturbing a change at the first convenient opportunity. They tell us that an election is coming

and we don't want our leaders coming to us only when they are seeking our votes. We want to see them sometimes without their war-paint on, when they can come without making pressing demands for votes, when they can show themselves among us as fellow Canadians and social beings like ourselves. And whether the election is near or not we know that winter is coming with inevitable strides. For that reason we want these chiefs, who sit in the seats of the mighty, to come and see us while yet the grass is green in the fields and the leaves green in the forest. We want them to come while yet they can travel as gentlemen, and meet us while we are feeling genial and prosperous and hospitable.

It is better they should both come soon, for various reasons. It is so much better to come by the palatial Empress across summer seas, than as strap passengers over the icebergs and humpbacks at the Capes in the rigor of winter. It is better they should come when they can see the wealth of the land in stock yard, barn and field, than in the time when the snow and ice have covered all, and when interrupted travel, delayed mails and freights might incline us to grumble and complain. Better come and see us now, Messrs. Laurier and Borden, for we want to have a real, friendly, heart to heart talk with you. After that, in the long winter evenings we can reflect upon your words of wisdom, of counsel and advice, and make up our minds how we shall vote next year.

Snow at Banff and two degrees of frost at Edmonton are unpleasant reminders at this date when the Northwest harvesting is only begun.

Canada's total trade last year was \$612,621,017, an increase over last year of over 10 millions, of which gain 61 million was in the import trade. Imports exceeded exports by \$99,000,000.

R. L. Borden, leader of the Canadian Opposition addressed the opening meeting of his national campaign in Halifax last evening. At this writing we have no report either of the size and character of the meeting or of Mr. Borden's line of argument. A prominent Toronto journal has predicted that the opening meeting of the series will be small. But that as it may they mark the beginning of political activity after a period of calm, and we anticipate they will develop sufficient interest before Mr. Borden shall reach Vancouver.

His Excellency the Governor General in speaking at Hillsboro yesterday, was very clear and explicit in condemning the course of permitting our best teachers to be lured away to the west by higher salaries than we are willing to pay. It would have been well if the ratepayers of a hundred school districts in this Province could have heard his words. Our teachers at least and with them the best friends of education in this Province will heartily endorse the sentiments he so forcibly expressed.
