The inside heating element has solid cast iron bottom and heavy steel sides and is lined with fire brick. This cast-iron top is dome shaped and is made with large cast-iron flanges which assist in radiating the heat and which are so arranged that a kettle can be used on them for boiling water. Work To Proceed On Hudson Bay Railway

WUNNIPEG, Oct. 15.—"Everything that can possibly be done on the Hudson Bay Railway before winter stops work, will be done," said Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Railways, last night, when he reached the city on his way to Regina.

Asked about reports emanating from Saskatoon to the effect that government had made arrangements to lay 18 miles of steel in the unfinished gap between Kettle Rapids and Port Nelson this winter, Dunning declined to make any statement on what might or might not be accomplished.

"All I can say is," declared the Minister of Railways, "that instructions issued are to get as much work done as weather conditions will permit."

Rev. "Dick" Sheppard Has To Retire

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 15.—London is losing one of the most remarkable clergymen of the present generation. Baffled by ill-health against which he has struggled with the same quiet but titanic force which has characterized all of his other activities, the Rev. H. R. L. Sheppard is obliged to resign the Vicarage of St. Martin-in-the-Fields. Standing on the edge of Trafalgar Square—it was built about a century or two before the construction of Trafalgar Square was even thought of—St. Martin's is a notable landmark of the West End of London, and "Dick" Sheppard has put a mark of another kind upon it. He went there in 1914, determined to make the place a spiritual magnet in this body centre of London life. Many doubted if it could be done, for while the church is massive and in some ways of noble outlines it is hardly calculated to attract the more heedless. But the straight simplicity and the manifest sincerity of the vicar effected a change very quickly. In a few months folks were glad to sit on the radiators or upon the steps of the pulpit to get the chance of hearing him, and it was no uncommon thing for the doors of the church to be closed an hour before service began.

In the autumn of 1916 Mr. Sheppard decided that the church should never be closed, and it became a place of midnight shelter for people stranded in the streets. In 1922, when St. Martin's was being restored, the crypt was brought into use, and since then it has been this part of the church which at night has offered hospitality to the destitute.

France Not Worrying About Future Of Oil

PARIS, Oct. 15.—France is one of the few countries that is not worrying about the future of her petroleum supply.

Potential petroleum sources, available to France says M. Pineau, director of the National Bureau of Combustible Liquids, if properly developed within the next decade, will furnish a supply sufficient for many years to come.

Of purely French sources, Madagascar promises the largest supply. The most important French source, however, M. Pineau finds is in Mosul, where French interests are permitted a twenty-five per cent share in the exploitation under the treaty of San Remo. Within five years oil from this source is expected to be almost sufficient for the entire needs of the country and its colonies, leaving Madagascar, domestic and colonial fields for reserve.

Presbyterians Now Number 154,000

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—An estimate that there are at present 154,000 adherents of the Presbyterian church in Canada was given by Rev. Dr. J. A. MacGillivray in an address to the concluding session of the annual synod conference of the Montreal and Ottawa Presbyteries here. Dr. MacGillivray, who is Moderator of the Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada said that while none really knew the strength of the continuing Presbyterian church, new members admitted to the church on profession of faith alone last year amounted to more than 10,000. There were 1,300 Presbyterian churches left in the Dominion since the advent of the United Church.

He declared there were weak spots in the church in the extreme East and West sections of the country, but prophesied the rapid growth and advancement of the church which was "now well on its feet."

Home From Meet Of Cavalry Assoc'n

SUSSEX, Oct. 15.—Lieut. Col. G. S. Kinnear has returned from western Canada, where he went to attend the annual meeting of the Cavalry Association at Edmonton. While in the west he visited his brother, Morris, in Jasper, and his brother-in-law, Prof. Walter Murray, of the University of Saskatchewan, in Saskatoon. This is the colonel's first trip to the west, and he was favorably impressed with the activities in the mining section of Ontario, through which he passed, and also of the country surrounding Edmonton.

Liquor Schooner Reported Freed

SHELIAC, N. B., Oct. 15.—Word was received in Kent County today that a large four masted crude oil burning schooner owned by a Buctouche resident and which was seized in the Strait of Northumberland last Saturday morning and towed to Quebec, had been released. The schooner, it was represented by her owner or captain, had been taken outside the three mile limit.

Capt. Lacouvee of the Customs Department cruiser Margaret, it is understood, charged that the cargo of the vessel had been disturbed before she reached her destination, the hatches having been taken off in violation of the regulations. The schooner is said to have left St. Pierre, Mig., about Oct. 1 with \$100,000 worth of liquor on board. What disposition of the liquor was made is not known here.

LINER REPORTS DROWNING OF RICH REALTOR

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Oct. 15.—D. P. Davis, wealthy real estate operator of New York and Tampa, Florida, lost his life early Wednesday morning while attempting a balancing feat in the porthole of his cabin, it was stated when the liner Majestic docked here yesterday. The weather was heavy, it was raining and there was a strong wind. The ship lurched and Davis was thrown into the sea. An alarm was raised but an exhaustive search proved futile.
