Airman Has Tough Battle With Cat

TULSA, Okla., May 13 (CP)—William B. Young, Dallas, S.D., flying student, locked his wounds today after a mid-air battle with a panic-stricken cat.

Young reported he was flying at 2,500 feet on a practice flight when a cat crawled from a recess in the cockpit and jumped onto his lap.

He petted it for a while, then he said the animal "went completely crazy," biting and clawing at his face.

Jack Gentry, flight chief at the aeronautics school, said Young then did "the only thing possible."

Grabbing the terrified cat with one hand and flying the plane with the other, he managed to open the cockpit cowling and threw the animal out.

Young's hands were bitten nearly to the bone in several places, Gentry said, and he was badly scratched about the face.

Prospects Of Abattoir For Newfoundland Trade Is Discussed At Souris

The regular quarterly meeting of the Eastern King's Board of Trade was held on Monday evening, May 8th, in the United Church Hall, Souris, with the president, B. L. Stewart in the chair. The minutes of the last meeting and the minutes of two executive meetings were read and approved.

The guest speaker of the evening, Mr. W. E. Agnew of Charlottetown, Trade Commissioner to Newfoundland, gave a splendid address on trade possibilities with the new Province. He stressed quality, neat packaging and the meeting of price competition as essential for holding the New-

foundland trade. Canned beef as packed in Souris received the high praise of the Commissioner who said it found a ready market in the old Island colony.

Following Mr. Agnew's address an informal round table discussion on different aspects of trade with Newfoundland was participated in by various members and it was believed by many that to improve the position in Souris as a meat-canning centre and from a health viewpoint of the citizens, an abattoir should be established here.

It was passed unanimously that a committee be appointed to draw up a strong resolution on the es-

establishment of an abattoir in Souris, and on making Souris a port of call for the Newfoundland subsidized steamship service, and to present it to the Provincial Government. The following were appointed by the chair to this committee: Messrs. Paul Gallant, chairman; L.W. Roper; Peter McAulay; T. J. Kieckham, and J. S. Gillespie.

The president, Mr. Stewart, was appointed to represent the Board in the preparation and presentation of the joint brief of the P. E. I. Boards of Trade before the Royal Commission on Transportation.

The June meeting of the board will feature a special movie show on fire fighting and fire prevention, with James Cudmore of Charlottetown as guest speaker.
