**RED CROSS WORK**.—The Brookfield Women's Patriotic Association has recently received the following donations for Red Cross work: Mrs. Kenneth McDonald 1 pair socks and 1 pair mittens; Mrs. Harry Paul 40c; Mrs. Daniel Nicholson 1 pair socks; Mrs. Catherine Nicholson, Clyde Station 1 pair socks; Mrs. B. Matheson, Mrs. Donald R. McLeod and Mrs. Effie McLeod have each contributed rolls into socks by members of the Society. Mrs. Alex. Campbell has sent 2 pairs socks and Mrs. A. Beaton 9 pairs socks and 7 pairs mittens, direct to the tranches.

**PATRIOTIC ASSOCIATION**.—The Brookfield Women's Patriotic Association was organized in Oct. 1915. The total cash receipts since that time have been \$207.12. Of this amount \$37.00 was paid to the Belgian Relief Fund and \$25.00 to the Red Cross Society. The balance \$145.12 was invested in goods which has been made into garments etc., and forwarded to the Red Cross headquarters in Charlottetown. In addition to this donation of socks, mittens, blankets, etc., have been received and forwarded. The following is a summary of articles prepared and donated: 50 pillows, 4 quilts, 2 blankets, 1 sheet 8 pairs bed socks, 2 handkerchiefs, 27 Hot Water Bottle Covers, 8 Flannelette night shirts, 1 bed jacket, 13 Pyjama shirts, 2 Pyjama suits, 14 pairs mittens, 2 pairs wristlets, 4 balclava caps, 1 pair pillow slips, 1 parcel old linen, 107 pairs socks.

**A GROWING BUSINESS**.—The annual meeting of the Duffinragge and Butter Co. Ltd., was held in the factory on Jan. 19th and was largely attended by the shareholders. The business of the past year has been most successful, cream being received from Patrons as far West as Kensington and east to North Lake and also Georgetown and Cardigan in addition to their local patronage. From the Secretary's report the following figures will speak for themselves. Number of patrons supplying cream, 309. Total quantity of butter produced, 81,682.080 lbs. Total quantity of butter manufactured, 107,218 lbs. Gross value of the year's output 30,174.02. Total amount to credit of patrons, \$25,859.02. Total amount retained for manufacturing, \$4,315.25. Loss by fractions, oil etc. Average price realized for butter, 27.97 cts. Net average value of butter fat, 28.20 cts. Average quantity of butter produced from 1 lb. fat, 1.169. Total quantity of buttermilk sold, \$191.05. The officers elected for the current year were President—Wm. J. Gibson; Vice-President—Edly Casser; Directors—Andrew McRae, Tupper Ferguson, Robert Rhynes, Herbert Thompson, John McDonald, and James Affleck. At the present time the factory is turning out between one thousand and twelve hundred pounds of butter per week under the management of Mr. Irving Miller, assisted by Mr. McCabe. The factory sustained a severe loss when its former capable manager, Mr. J. P. Simmons resigned to join the colors and he is followed by the very best wishes of the entire district. The directors to further increase the output of the factory which is steadily forging to the front, have decided to start the system of cream grading which will no doubt prove most satisfactory to all patrons and if the present success continues the already large and commodious building in the very near future will have to be still further enlarged to meet the growing demands. The company is to be heartily congratulated on their splendid success.

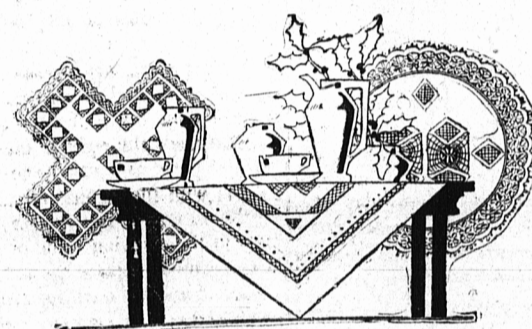

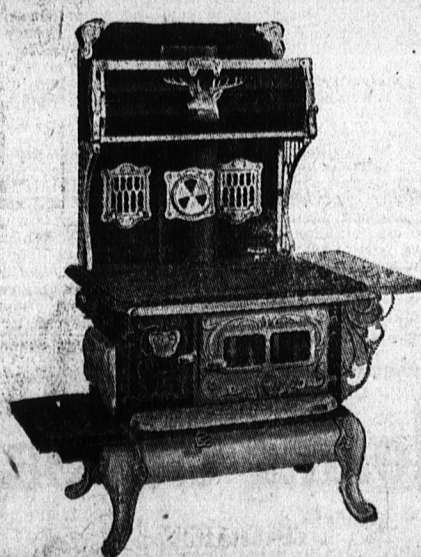
