ABBIES DEFEAT SAINTS IN INTERESTING GAME

Take lead in Early Stages and Come out at the Long end of 9-4 Score—Good Exhibition of Baseball

A fair sized attendance of fans witnessed the baseball game last evening between the Abegweits and St. Dunstons at the A. A. A. grounds. For early season ball the brand offered by the contesting teams was very good; and provided interest and excitement at every stage of the game. Spectacular plays were noticeable in their absence, and at no time from third to last innings did the issue seem in doubt. Though rain threatened in the fifth the game ran to eight frames, when the weather and the fading light forced it to a close.

1st Inning.—Saints went to bat first. With one man out on a pop fly, O'Brien went to first on an error. Mooney's fly was caught by Bradley; O'Brien came home on an error and L. Murphy was the last man out with a red hot liner to McEachern.

2nd Inning.—Saints—A. Murphy was first man down on a nice outfield catch by McEachern. Praught and B. McDonald both struck out.

3rd Inning.—Abegweits—McCarey stretched a single into a two bagger, beating the ball by a fraction of a second, and Lynds earned a pass on balls and McCarey came in on an error. With Ryan on second, Bradley's long fly to O'Brien provided a double play. McQuaid went out on an easy infield fly.

4th Inning.—Saints—L. Murphy made first, A. Murphy, D. Praught, and B. McDonald fanned.

5th Inning.—Abegweits—Francis singled, McCarey flied to O'Brien, and Lynds took first base. Ryan flied to B. McDonald, and Bradley brought in the two base-runners. McQuaid hit by pitched ball, went to first, Brought in Bradley and McEachern pop flied to Gillis at first. Saints 2—Abegweits 4.

6th Inning.—Saints—R. McDonald struck out, O'Brien flied to the infield. Gillis hit by pitched ball, went to first, Mooney flied to Bradley. Abegweits—Cronin hit a sizzling grounder past third baseman for a two bagger; Cameron was beaten by the ball at first. Cronin came home on a single by Francis, who was tagged out trying to steal. McCarey hit the ball over the fence and was allowed two bases. Lynds on first and McCarey home on errors. Ryan went out at first. Saints 2—Abegweits 6.

7th Inning.—Saints—McQuaid hit a double sacker and L. Murphy walked and stole second, while McQuaid advanced to third. A Murphy's safe hit brought in the plate. Praught fanned, and B. McDonald's two bagger brought in A. Murphy. R. McDonald struck out.

8th Inning.—Abegweits—Bradley flied to McQuaid, "Lefty" singled and made second and third on errors. McEachern's double took him home and "Whacker" in turn was brought to the plate by Cronin's two bagger. Cameron fanned and Francis failed to reach first. Saints 4—Abegweits 8.

9th Inning.—Saints—O'Brien to Bradley and Gillis took first on a pitched ball. With the latter on second, Ryan made a pretty double play from Mooney's outfield fly, with the assistance of Bradley at second.

Abegweits.—McCarey fanned and Lynds was put out at first. Ryan singled and reached third on an overthrow. He was brought in by Bradley's single. McQuaid struck out. Saints 4—Abegweits 9.

10th Inning.—Saints—McQuaid and L. Murphy went out at first and A. Murphy fanned.

MANNA WINS DERBY CLASSIC

EPSOM, May 27.—"Manna" by Phalaris out of Waffles owned by H. E. Morris won the Derby today with Steve Donoghue, star jockey riding to his sixth Derby victory. "Manna" finished eight lengths ahead of 28 runners. Donoghue pushed Manna ahead at the start, held the lead and was pulling up at the finish line, when his opponents were using the whip in a final desperate effort. Agta Khans "Zionist" was second and two lengths farther back came Sirdar owned by the American McCormick. Time for the distance was 2:40 2-5. Lord Astor's "Cross Bow" the favorite, Lord Derby's Conquistador, second lord and the French entry "Polemy", Runnymede and others fought for a place, but were hopelessly outclassed.

A pouring rain marred the pleasure, but not the numbers of the spectators and the heavy track made the race unpleasant for many of the entries that always showed their best form on a dry field.

King George congratulated the winner and this evening gave the annual dinner to leading sportsmen at Buckingham Palace.

Brocco And Egg At Odds, Sign Armistice For Race

PARIS, May 27.—During the last six-day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden, New York, the veterans Maurice Brocco and Oscar Egg, collaborated to give a fine exhibition of team work. It has been learned that the two, although paired for the race, have not been on good terms and have not spoken to each other for several years. They rode under the terms of an armistice extending over the period of the race, during which the only words exchanged related to the contest.

Silent hostilities were resumed at the conclusion of the race and, when they returned to Europe on the same steamer, neither recognized the other during the voyage. When reservations were being made Brocco is said to have told the steamer agent: "Place me anywhere in the boat as long as I am far enough away from Egg. This last week of Egg will do me for a lifetime."

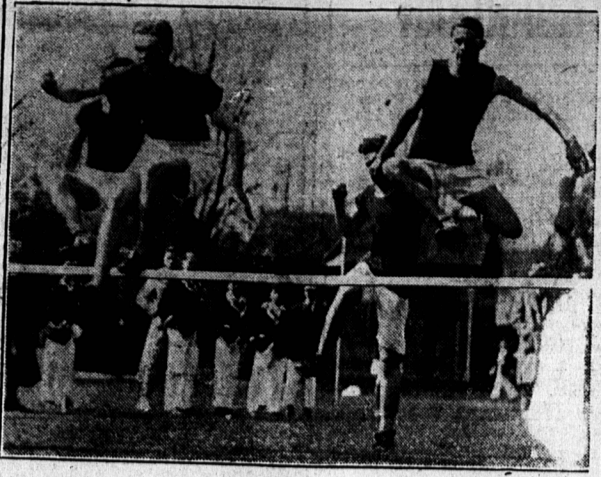

MCTIGUE VERY CONFIDENT OF VICTORY TOMORROW

Mike Certain He Will Defeat "Pop-em Paul" Berlenbach at Yankee Stadium.

NEW YORK, May 27.—Mick McTigue has become bold, bad Michael now. The light heavyweight champion of the world is to defend his title in a fifteen round bout against Paul Berlenbach at the Yankee Stadium Friday night, but instead of having his nerves shattered at the thought of meeting Oom Paul, the champion is the personification of confidence.

"This assurance came to the surface in one utterance at his training camp in Summit, N. J., yesterday. "What are your plans after the fight with Berlenbach? Do you intend to return to Ireland?" a bystander asked McTigue.

"No, I don't think I'll go to Ireland," answered McTigue, "for I expect to meet Jack Delaney six weeks after my fight with Berlenbach."

That explains better than anything else Mike's feeling toward the coming bout in which his title will be involved. The question came out of a clear sky, yet McTigue was so quick with the answer that there was no chance of its being premeditated. The winner of the McTigue-Berlenbach argument is scheduled to meet the winner of the tussle between Jack Delaney and Tony Morillo, which will be the semi-final of the 29th. McTigue figures that Delaney will beat Marullo and so he sees nothing but a match with the Bridgeport battler, for he is certain that he is a sure winner over Berlenbach.

"That fellow Ray Neuman makes a good sparring partner for you," continued the conversation after McTigue had finished his boxing for the day. "He seems to know more than any of the other men who trade punches with you in training."

"Perhaps that's right," answered McTigue, "but at that I think any of them knows three times as much as Berlenbach. I'll tell you what's going to win this fight. It's the old noddle, and when it comes to ring head I'm sure that I have the edge on Berlenbach."

"He may be able to hit harder than I, but if he can't land that punch it won't be worth a dime. And to my way of thinking there isn't any uncertainty about it; he simply won't land it. He telegraphs every one of his body blows, and I'll be ready to land before the message starts over the wires."
