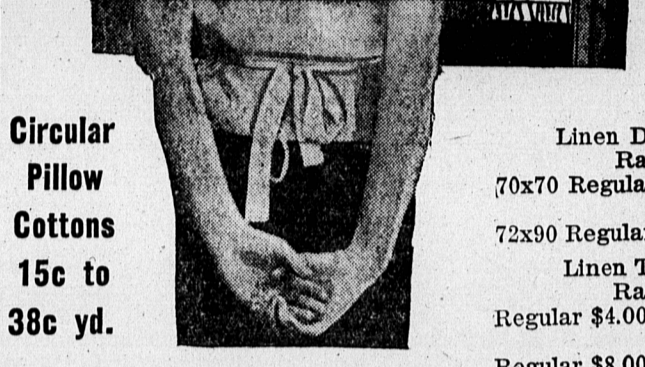

RAILWAY WHARF The oil tanker "Hickory" which arrived in port Tuesday evening from Halifax and discharged 8,000 barrels of gasoline for the Imperial Oil Company, has sailed again on return to Halifax, N. S.

TUG LISGAR IN PORT The Government tug boat Lisgar, under command of Captain Gamble, arrived in port from Pictou, N. S., with two scows number 105 and 115 in tow. A dredge bucket and bucket arm are being loaded onto one of the scows by Bruce Stewart & Co., at which place they were being repaired. After being loaded they will be towed over to Southport Wharf, where they will remain for the present time. They belong to Dredge No. 9 which is at present laid up in Georgetown. The tug Lisgar wintered in Sydney, N. S., and at opening of navigation she towed D. P. W. Scow Number 157 to St. Peter's, C. B.
