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## ABBIES TURN BACK WOLVERINES 4 TO 3

### Pete Kelly's Goal In Third Period Decides Outcome

Lead Changes Often In Rugged, Hard Fought Battle — Penalties Again Play Important Part In Tilt.

"Old Man Jinx" was taken for a ride at the Forum last night when the Abbeys, led by that power line of Kane, Kelly and Nicholson, outplayed and outfought a howling Wolf pack from Halifax to the tune of 4 to 3 to once again get within striking distance of the leaders of the Maritime "Big Four" League.

It was a goal from the stick of Pete Kelly, on a double assist from his two mates early in the final period that spelt victory for the local crew in a game that saw the fans treated to a little bit of everything. To say it was rugged would be putting it mildly. Sticks were carried high all night and elbows and knees came into frequent use as Referee Herbert gave them plenty of leeway. Only when a player was in scoring position did he clamp down hard, at other times it being the survival of the fittest. But at that the visitors were the worst offenders, Shields in particular carrying his stick shoulder high all evening.

The game was productive of some brilliant hockey though. Clever combination thrusts that carried the attackers to the goalmouth had the goalies perform sensationally. After the winners had started the second period leading 1-0, so fast did the goals come and the lead alternate that it was hard to keep track of. Four counters were scored within three minutes of each other in the second session and then to cap it all, it took the Abbeys just 15 seconds to get the winning marker after the Wolves had evened matters at 3-3.

Held to one goal in the first period by the sensational work of Bubar, the Abbeys saw their lead wiped out and were one down five minutes after the start of the middle period. Penalties to Currie and Smith in quick succession sent the visitors take advantage of man power to score two quick counters. Just a minute and 32 seconds it took the locals to garner a 3-2 lead which they held to the end of the period.

Hardly had the third period got underway when Shields slapped in the tying counter from a face off at the side of Sargent's cage. Moshier had drawn a penalty for a tripping offence just seconds before. The teams went back to centre ice and Kane, Kelly and Nicholson raced in on the attack to cage the winning counter. It was just 12 seconds after the Wolverine score, which is mighty fast work and speaks volumes for the fighting hearts that beat under the Abbeys jerseys this season.

Again it was Kelly, Kane and Nicholson who were the shining lights on the stage of offence. With Frankie Currie turning in a great performance on the rear-guard, Sargent also was his usual brilliant self, some of his stops last night bordering on the miraculous.

"Daddy" Bubar was easily the star of the Wolverine line-up but he might easily have had double that amount and still turn in a brilliant performance. Lennan, McGlashen and Moshier bore the brunt of their squad's offensive, being highly dangerous all evening.

The fine game being turned in by Frankie Currie on the Abbe defence was the big feature of the opening period. Only tough luck kept him out of the summary as he engineered dangerous raids by fast breaking dashes.

The game started to develop into a rugged battle right from the opening gong. Wolverines had the better of the play for the first two minutes, displaying some tricky stickhandling. Bubar's first save of the game was sensational as Kelly and Kane fore right in only to have Pete's shot rebound off his pads. Sticks were being carried high and Currie drew the first penalty for boarding Moshier. Wolves sent every man up but Sargent was sensational in the Abbe cage.

The zeal of the Wolves led to the first Abbe goal. Retand, replacing Currie, cleared to the center zone. Kelly following fast, poke checked the puck from Lavigne, Nicholson snaring the loose water. Hickey only had Graham to beat and his pass to Kelly took the redhead right in to fool Bubar completely. It was 4 minutes and 13 seconds from the start and a mighty clever play.

Play was of the see-saw variety as the teams opened wide. Forwards were being met by stiff body checks as they rode in and when they did break through, both goalies, Sargent and Bubar, were sensational. Abbeys had the better chances, however, and on the play of the period had a slight edge. Bubar had 12 stops to his credit, most of them from close range, while Sargent warded off 10 successfully.

### U.S. GOLFERS HOLD SWAY IN AUSTRALIA

U. S. Players Win Seven of Eight Opening Matches of \$5,000 Centenary Tourney.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MELBOURNE, Australia, Nov. 21—With one exception, the \$5,000 Melbourne centenary professional golf championship became an all-American affair today, with invaders from the United States winning seven of the eight opening round matches.

Ky Laffoon of Denver, missed a three-foot putt on the 37th green and was eliminated from the match play tournament by Martin Smith of Victoria, the sole surviving homebred contender for the first prize of \$2,500.

While Laffoon fell by the wayside, Jimmy Thomson of Los Angeles winner of \$5,000 in the centenary 72-hole open last week, squeaked through with a one-up victory over Rufus Stewart, portly South Australian shotmaker.

Paul Runyan of White Plains, N. Y., United States professional title holder, scored the most lopsided victory of the day, swamping Sam Richardson of New South Wales, 11 and 9. Harry Cooper of Chicago won from Teddy Mastenich of Victoria, 10 and 9, while Leo Diegel of Philadelphia accounted for Charlie Gray of New South Wales, 9 and 7.

Denny Shute of Philadelphia, 1933 British open king, defeated Harry Eborer of Victoria, 4 and 3. Craig Wood of Deal, N. J., eliminated Fergus McMahon of South Australia, 3 and 1, and Joe Egar of Waco, Tex., defeated Lou Kelly of New South Wales, 2 and 1.

The round of eight will be played tomorrow at 36 holes.

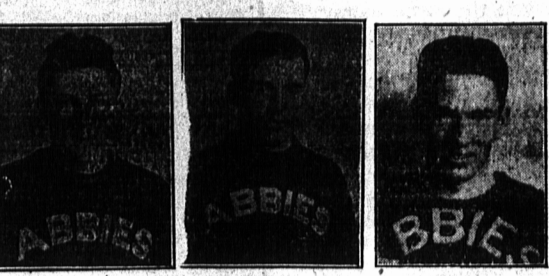

### League Leaders Handed Setback

Refusal to Aid In Ending Chaco Dispute Based On Counter-proposals.

(By Joseph E. Sharkey) (Associated Press Foreign Staff) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) GENEVA, Nov. 21—The belief was expressed in League of Nations circles tonight that Paraguay already has rejected the League's proposals for ending the Chaco War.

This impression, delegates indicated, was created by the series of counter-proposals to the League's plans for ending the bloody conflict between Paraguay and Bolivia in the South American jungles presented to the special assembly today. These counter-proposals, presented by Dr. Ramon Caballero Bedoya, Paraguayan delegate, were regarded as destroying the league's projects.

The Associated Press learned that assembly President Francisco Castillo Najera of Mexico had told his colleagues in the secret session of the assembly committee that "I, myself, think the Paraguayan proposals constitute a refusal."

Dr. Caballero, however, in an interview protested against the idea that he was virtually rejecting the League's plan. He said, on the contrary, that his aim was to reinforce the peace efforts.

The Paraguayan delegate had proposed the immediate cessation of hostilities and demobilization without delay of the opposing armies, and a non-aggression pact, in which "aggressor" would be defined, to be modelled on the multilateral pact signed at London in 1928.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 21—Chicago Cubs tonight sent pitchers Bud Tinning and Dick Ward and back to St. Louis Cardinals for pitcher Tex Carleton.

Carleton won 16 games and lost 11 for the world champions during the past season. Tinning won four and lost six for the third-place Cubs.

Ward, with the Cubs for a while last season as a relief pitcher, was sent to Los Angeles, where he won 13 and lost four.
