N. Y. Stocks Climbs To New Summer Crest

NEW YORK, Aug. 1. (AP)—The stock market climbed to a new crest in its summer rally today. In the first general rise since last Tuesday, leading issues advanced fractions to around a point. Not since mid-May has the market, on average, been so high. The advance was slow and labored and also persistent. Closing prices were tops for the day in most cases.

Despite the improvement in prices, traders were unable to whip up much enthusiasm. Turnover amounted to 860,000 shares but sales in Commonwealth and Southern alone accounted for 191,200 shares. Business Friday amounted to 640,000 shares.

Today's rise marked the resumption of a summer rally that has been stalled for the past three trading days. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 3 of one point to 63.2. This level was last touched on May 19 and topped May 18. The industrial group made the best showing, with the rail and utility sections tied for second place.

Reports of improved business spread to the luxury field, Victor A. Fitch, president of Seagram's Distillers Corp., predicted that industry-wide liquor sales will continue to beat 1948 levels. Wealth and Southern, which included one block of 100,000 shares, was written mostly at the unchanged price of 4-3/4. In the last few minutes, however, a block of 4,200 shares traded at 4-7/8, a new high for the year.

The list of most active stocks was notable for the large number of higher priced issues, with all but a few at higher prices. Included were U. S. Steel, Du Pont, Chrysler, General Motors, American Telephone, and Sears Roebuck. A Fitch, president of Seagram's Distillers Corp., predicted that industry-wide liquor sales will continue to beat 1948 levels.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1. (CP)—Reversing the usual form, sales of industrial stocks outnumbered those of the mining section during today's listless session of the stock exchange. Brokers blamed the slack state of exchange business on the fact many outside markets were on holiday.
