Baldwin's Speech

Pleases France

PARIS, July 16.—Although the text of Mr. Baldwin's speech arrived here too late to allow of official examination tonight, it was indicated among authoritative Frenchmen that the first impression in general was distinctly pleasing particularly less severe than the French had been led to expect.

None of the official text had arrived before Premier Poincaré left his office for the day, but sufficient of the press summary came to allow a number of high authorities to examine the general principles of the address. What seems to please these circles, most of all, is that they see no hint of separate action by Great Britain in dealing with Germany.

The French take as a distinctly good sign Mr. Baldwin's gentle but firm warning to Germany not to over-emphasize the importance of minor differences among the Allies. They commented, however, with more reserve on the Premier's assertions concerning the inseparability of reparations and the Allied debts although until the official text is received they are unwilling to criticize even this part of his address adversely. The section of the statement least pleasing to the French, perhaps, is that in connection with the occupation of the Ruhr. One influential Frenchman, commenting on this tonight, said: "It is easy enough to say, 'I told you so,' and our natural answer to that is, 'We might have got something if we had not had to do it alone.'"

Plans To Produce Super-Sheep Race

PARIS, July 16.—With his scalpel, Dr. Voronoff expects soon to balance French imports and exports. This is to be done by the production of a super-race of sheep with wool 16 inches long. France is now importing on an average 2,000,000,000 francs' worth of wool annually most of it from England and Australia. Dr. Voronoff's sheep would increase France's production 1,000 per cent and give her wool exports even after the textile factories had been enlarged.

In experiments on rams, Dr. Volonoff has discovered he declares, that they not only ceased to grow old but that the wool at the tip of the length of that of a Merino. Dr. Voronoff consequently has asked for 75 rams in order to produce a new super-race. Twenty-five of these animals will be sacrificed for the benefit of the other 50. The results of the operation will be complete in six months, hair and all. By selection and breeding he expects to produce the super-sheep.

M. Fathon, president of the central committee of the woolen industry who is interested in Dr. Voronoff's proposition, has promised the rams at the surgeons will produce the wool. It is also said that M. Merlin and M. Carde, governors of two of France's colonies in Western Africa, have asked that experiments be carried on in the plantations of their territory, where conditions are most favorable for sheep raising.


