On the trip out in the morning the Rocky Point boat played a prominent part by opening a channel up the river for the smaller craft, after that the going was hard on the way, ice was in abundance. At entrance to the harbor an ice barrier had formed and it looked for awhile as though they would not make it, but a stiff north west gale soon broke the chain allowing them to proceed. Landing at the Island was also a hard job, the boat finally had to resort to a round-about course, berthing on the south side of the Island. It may be mentioned that a dory being in tow was swamped by the heavy seas off the harbor's mouth. The return trip was not the least arduous. Mr. Reddin saying that approximately fifteen miles of ice, lolly and water was covered before making port—such is the transportation problem to Governor's Island at the present time.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Dec. 14.—The outstanding feature of the egg market today is the increasing receipts throughout the West, especially in Calgary and Edmonton. A reduction in turkey prices is going into effect at many points this week. Toronto is unchanged. Country shippers report increasing receipts and are paying extras 60, firsts 50, seconds 30, pullets 40, and making sales extras 70, firsts 60, seconds 35, pullets 45. O. B. offering 28 for old toms. Montreal dealers are bidding a cent less. Winnipeg egg market is quiet. Fresh receipts show increase over last. Movement of storage stocks reported slow. Egg prices unchanged. Poultry receipts of dressed heavy prices unchanged, lower prices looked for on Wednesday.

IT IS NOT TOO LATE FOR BAYER TO FINISH YOUR PHOTOS FOR XMAS MONTREAL, Que. Dec. 14.—The export trade in wheat and barley on the Montreal market, over the weekend was reported very quiet there being only odd lots of wheat worked with the United Kingdom and the continent when prices declined at Winnipeg. A steady feeling prevailed in the local market for cash grain with moderate amount of business passing in car lots. Sales of Ontario and Quebec No. 2 white oats were made at 53c, no 3 white at 51 1/2c and No. 4 white at 50 cents per bushel, extract, Canadian western grades were steady. A fair volume of business was transacted in the spring and winter wheat flour markets and prices were steady. Prices for all grades of millfeed were well maintained under a steady demand. The market for standard grades of rolled oats was moderately active and the tone was quiet but firm. The butter and cheese markets were without any new feature to note.
