The death occurred at his home Stanley Bridge on July 8th of Alfred E. Fyfe in his 75th year. The deceased was apparently in his usual good health to within a few weeks of his passing when he suffered a heart condition from which he never recovered. In his passing Stanley Bridge and surrounding districts has suffered the loss of a kind neighbour and upright citizen.
