### Roving Reporter Visits Bloomfield

Continuing my visits around Prince County I called recently, at Bloomfield, another village which although small is very busy.

My first call was at the Post Office where I found Mrs. Braden Keefe busy handing out the mail. Mr. Alonzo Foley has been in charge of the Post Office for about 25 years which indeed is a very fine record.

Leaving the Post Office I crossed the tracks to visit Ray Gallant's store. Inside I found his better-half waiting on their many customers. I had a very pleasant chat with Mrs. Gallant who told me of the trying time they had serving the public while we were overseas. Her husband was hard to get and as there were only two stores in operation at Bloomfield at that time Mr. and Mrs. Gallant were forced to work very hard, help being unobtainable in the store Mr. and Mrs. Gallant handle almost everything in the line of groceries, hardware, dry goods, feeds and school supplies and will be buying potatoes this Fall.

Among the many customers that called while I was there were Mr. and Mrs. MacKenzie from Campbellton, Neil Arsenault, who operates a shoe and harness repair shop, Stephen Doyle who is in the trucking business, Albert Saunders, the blacksmith from Bloomfield Corner, Kenneth MacDonald, employed at Fred Luttrell's, Robert Shaw, the mail driver, Byron McKenna, Jardine Gaudin, Christopher Smith, Norman Griffin and Ada Clements. Apart from this store which they have been operating for 16 years Mr. Gallant has an undertaking business.

Bloomfield also has a co-operative store with Melvin Richards in charge and Melvin Peters as helper. One thing worthy of mention in this village is "Lucky Pal", a horse owned until recently by Frank MacDougall, the station agent. "Lucky Pal" started her career by taking the honors at the local races, then Mr. MacDougall entered her in the bigger races where she continued to carry off the ribbons. Mr. George Brooks, Kensington, bought "Lucky Pal" and with Earl Temple in charge sent her to Foxboro, Mass., which is one of the finest tracks in U. S. A.

The only report received here to date is that she arrived safely at Foxboro and everyone in Bloomfield is anxiously awaiting word from "Lucky Pal" and hoping that she continues to win as she did at home.

Later I called at Keith Pratt's store and a busy place it was with his capable clerks Vance McKay and Maude Pratt going steady. Ruby Thompson, the school teacher for Bloomfield, does the bookkeeping here in her spare time and holidays. Keith was working in the warehouse weighing in Irish wool with the moss inspector, Ira Ellis from O'Leary looking on.

There were many people around and Mr. and Mrs. Arsenault, and in George Webb from Woodstock, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Thompson, Ed Clements and Rayburn Doyle, while out around the station there was George Palmer and Charles McInnis, formerly from here and now in Amherst loading cattle.

Along with the store Keith has a lovely new egg grading station, the work being done by Albert McKay and Louis Peters, while Neil Arsenault finished off with a fine paint job and the station is Leigh Thompson, the egg grader, busy stamping eggs for Britain. At this point Keith wondered how the Government expected the people to supply eggs for Britain with the cost of feed so high and the eggs so low. Connected with the station is the chicken killer, Leigh McKay, who is kept busy the year round.

Keith also lost his home and warehouse in the fire and with that went his blueberry grading machine. He hopes to have this machine replaced in time for the berry season next year.

In the store Keith showed me lovely new briar pipes which had just arrived from the United States; also new linen tablecloth, aluminum levels, and he is expecting white chinaware soon. This is just a few of the many hard-to-get items he is now getting back in the store. During our conversation Keith mentioned the school trustees who are William Smith, George Palmer and William O'Halloran. Mr. Wm. Smith has been trustee for 50 years, a record which we think is hard to beat.

Keith told me of other lines of business in and about Bloomfield, such as the sawing mill operated by Richard Adams, Roy Smith the section man, who is going in for turkeys, and Ramie Arsenault, a
