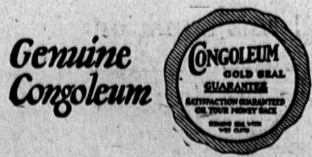

A. F. L. Opens 49th. Convention

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 7.—While the strains of the "Star Spangled Banner" and "O Canada" rolled through the spacious convention hall, and out into the foyer of the Royal York Hotel, the 49th annual convention of the American Federation of Labor opened the first of its sessions today. Extending a right royal welcome to the finest city in Canada, and the brightest spot in the British Empire, Mayor Sam McBride declared that Toronto had less labor troubles during the last six years than any other city in the world.

"Take Canada with her nine or ten million people and you will find very little trouble," he said. Referring to a statement by William Varley, that the mayor had not always been "four square behind the workers," Mr. McBride said that the man who just stood still and made no move at all was a donkey and nothing more. OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 8.—Presbyterians in solemn rejoicing last night commemorated the union of Presbyterian Churches in Scotland, after centuries of ecclesiastical dispute, the termination of which was brought about yesterday in St. Giles' Church, Edinburgh, when the United Free Church of Scotland and the Church of Scotland united to become the New United Church of Scotland.

St. Andrew's Church was the scene of the commemorative service, with nine clergy of the city and district seated semi-circularly around the pulpit. The Moderator, Rev. A. G. Cameron, presided; Rev. W. H. Leatham gave the address and practically every minister present took part in the services.

SHIPMENT OF DRUGS

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 8.—Nothing in the Pharmaceutical law of Quebec prohibits outside houses from shipping drugs here which only pharmacists are permitted by law to sell, it was decided by Mr. Justice Lorange in the Superior Court yesterday in dismissing an action for \$500 taken by the Pharmaceutical Association of the Province of Quebec against the T. SEEKING TREASURE FROM SUNKEN GALLEON

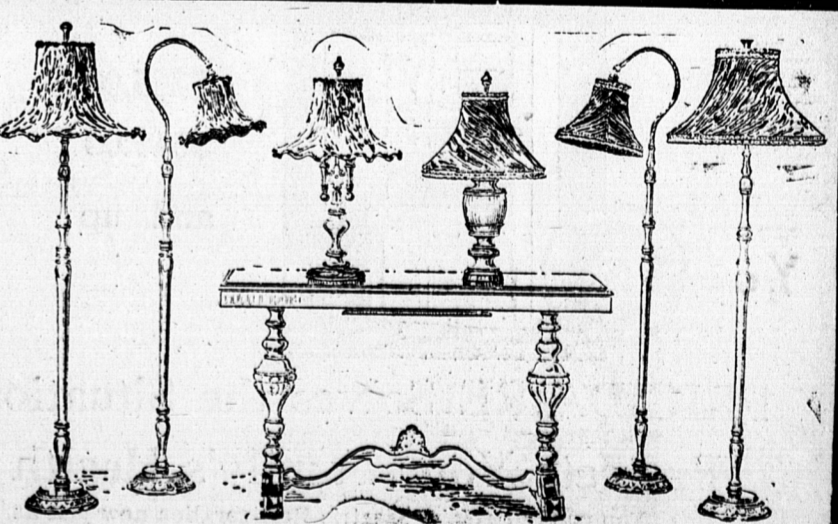
