Plans Develop For Hockey's Hall Of Fame

KINGSTON, Ont., July 8 (CP)—Choice of a site for hockey's Hall of Fame in this city which lays claim to being the birthplace of Canada's chief winter sport is to be made in the near future although much planning remains to be done before actual construction can be started. The promoters are intent on a memorial which "will be a most acceptable tribute to the men who have done so much to develop hockey, nationally and internationally and as players and executives." Recently a delegation from the local committee, including architect and building contractor, visited the Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y., and obtained much useful information. The members attended a ceremony at which Governor Dewey of New York unveiled a bronze monument to the late Judge K. M. Landis, former baseball czar. Financial objective of the Hockey Hall of Fame is \$50,000 and Captain Sutherland reports that \$35,000 has already been received from organizations and individuals although so far there has been no special campaign for funds. The National Hockey League donated \$7,000 and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association \$10,000. The City of Kingston gave \$5,000. Other donations have come from the Ontario Hockey Association and the United States Amateur Hockey Association. Individual donors include George McNamara, John David Eaton, Mrs. James Richardson, Reginald Crawford, Captain Sutherland and Walter A. Brown, president of the Boston Arena Corporation. Trophies Donated Mayor Stuart Crawford of Kingston, president of the Hall of Fame, presented two hand-made trophies, one from J. Gill Gardner of Brockville and S. L. Bishop of North Battleford, Sask. These and other hockey trophies which have been offered are to be placed in the museum section on the second floor of the projected building. The committee plans to have framed photographs of all the hockey immortals selected for the shrine hung in the building. Names of players have been selected and their names have been inscribed in the magnificent Intercontinental Hockey book, an illuminated Old English type. All are immortals of the sport—Howie Morenz, Georges Vézina, Frank McCool, Babe Baker, Charles (Chuck) Gardner, Harvey Pulford, Eddie Gerard, Hod Stuart and Tom Phillips. Six men have been selected as "builders of hockey"—John Ross Robertson, W. A. Hewitt and Francis Nelson of Toronto; Frank Calder and William Northey of Montreal; and Claude C. Robinson of Winnipeg.

Passeau And Feller Open All-Star Classic Today

BOSTON, July 8 (AP)—Bob Feller, Cleveland's star, and Claude Passeau, veteran Chicago Cubs right-hander who pitched a one-hitter against Detroit in the last world series, today were nominated to square off at the start of the 13th annual all-star game between the American and National Leagues tomorrow at Fenway Park. Manager Steve O'Neill of the American Leaguers announced that Feller, the game's leading strike-out artist, would be followed after three innings by Hal Newhouse of Detroit Tigers, with South Chatham of the Yankees blazing them across in the last three frames. Providing, of course, that everything goes according to schedule. Del Egan, sensational young outfielder of the Philadelphia Nationals, won the distinction of being the only rookie picked to start on either side. Ironically, the sixth place New York Giants gained two places in National League line-up. Walker Cooper, the \$175,000 number, was chosen to catch Passeau, and Johnny Mize, the league's leading home-run knocker, will start on first. While the National League club will be no slouch and potentially packs a good wallop at the plate, it simply does not stack up with the Americans on paper, either in pitching or batting, and there is no reason to doubt that the 8-1-1 odds being quoted against the senior circuit are just about right.
