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### ABOUT REVALUATION

The statement was made in yesterday's Daily Bulletin that the External Trade Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, for the purpose of showing the actual volume situation of Canadian trade during the twelve months ending August, 1932, had taken 24 items, representing two thirds of the total Canadian domestic export during that period, and had re-valued them on the basis of average prices in 1930. These items showed a decrease of almost 60 per cent in values and, if the same ratio were applied to the remaining one third which, of course, includes an immense number of small items, the declared value of \$521,814,843 would be \$833,900,065.

Apparently the statement aroused more than a little interest and so in order to make more definite the effect upon trade figures which lowered prices have had the 24 items are as follows, the figures in brackets being the revaluation on the 1930 prices:
