
We have also fitted up a new Children's Clothing department on the second floor.

NEWS OF WAR IS NOW SCARCE

Rumors that Russians Threatened by Bandits.

LONDON, March 4.—Hardly a word of news from the seat of war, with the exception of the Russian official despatches, is published here this morning, and it now seems clear that the story in the morning Telegraph two days ago of a bombardment of Port Arthur by the Japanese of Feb. 29, is nothing more than a re-echo of previous attacks.

From Yin Kow comes an unconfirmed report that 500 bandits, armed with modern rifles, have attacked a Russian post to the west of Halchong (Halchong is thirty-two miles east by north of Newchwang.) There was severe fighting and both sides lost heavily. This report is discredited at Yin Kow. If it is true, it indicates that a serious danger is confronting Russia in these well armed brigand bands. According to the Daily Mail's account of this affair, six Japanese were found dead among the bandits. This would tend to show that the Japanese are organizing the bands.

Report received here from Tokio declares that Japan has granted permission for fifty-three foreign newspaper correspondents to accompany the Japanese

forces. Seventeen of these correspondents are Americans. The date of their departure has not been fixed.

A mile and a quarter of the Siberian railroad, according to the Tokio reports, has been destroyed in the Niuguta district, between Vladivostok and Harbin.

The Tien Tsin correspondent of the Standard cables that the Russians are strongly fortifying points south of Mukden. Thousands of coolies who are working day and night on the ramparts and entrenchments of Halchong are compelled to labor without pay.

Heartrending stories are appearing in the English newspapers of the suffering of refugees from Port Arthur on the train journey to European Russia. It is bitterly cold and there is scarcity of food and water. Several children have been suffocated under the rugs and shawls with which they were covered in attempts to keep them warm. Owing to exposure and exhaustion an epidemic of influenza has broken out among the refugees.

St. PETERSBURG, March 4.—According to a despatch from Port Arthur, 29 Chinese have been arrested there for signalling to the Japanese ships from the shore with flashlights and lanterns. A warning has been issued that similar offenders will hereafter be treated as spies and shot.

Although it is denied that the present plans of the admiralty contemplate the despatch of either the Black sea or the Baltic fleets to the Far East, it is beyond question that both are being prepared with the greatest haste to meet any emergency that may arise. General Altwaer the artillery expert, and Admiral Vorhok have been inspecting the ships and crews of the Black sea fleet.

Work on the warships is being pushed night and day. The battleship Borodino, the battleship Orel and the transport Kamchatka are nearing completion at the admiralty dockyards here.

In the dead of night the ice-bound Neva is like an Arctic landscape, lighted for half a mile by the flare of blazing stacks the silence broken by the dim of drumming hammers.

The battleship Borodino must be taken to Cronstadt to receive her armors and it is reported that the ice-breaker Ermack will be brought from Reval to cut a channel to the arsenal there.

The battleship Alexander III, at Cronstadt, is ready, and the Russian fleet, recently at Jibuti, French Soma Island, is returning so that when the spring opens Russia will have an imposing naval array in the Baltic.

About 800 volunteer workmen have left here to work at the dockyards of Port Arthur and Vladivostok.
