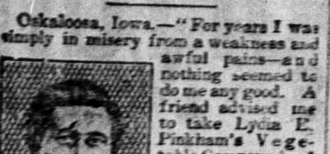

Ducks Easy To Raise And Sell

Fourth to ninth week (growing ration): Two quarts cornmeal, two quarts wheat bran, one quart flour middlings, one-half quart beef scraps, one handful sand or grit, one handful bone meal or oyster shell, greens feed.

Fattening ration: Four quarts cornmeal, one quart bran, one quart flour middlings, sand or grit, 15 per cent. meat scraps.

Ration for brooders: One quart cornmeal, one quart bran, one quart of ground oats, one quart flour middlings, 12 per cent. beef scraps, sand and oyster shell, green feed and vegetables.

In all cases the mash should be mixed to a crumbly state either with water or milk, and fed five times per day during the first three weeks and three times a day thereafter. Water for the ducklings to swim in is not necessary or desirable. Plenty of shade, either natural or artificial, must be furnished, or the losses will be heavy during the late spring and early summer, as the ducks stand the hot sun. Ducks and ducklings do not like radical changes in their rations—make them gradually.

In case ducks are raised on a large scale and kept in large flocks, great care should be taken to avoid frightening them. Fear, or perhaps self-preservation, will often cause them to run toward a corner or together and "pile up," thereby incurring great loss of life. For this reason, fruit trees in yards are undesirable, as much as they are needed for shade, as the falling of diseased or injured fruit frightens the ducks.

THE GREAT LINE FENCE PROBLEM

Of all the questions received here, during the growing season, it is probably that the "line fence" proposition leads in number. Practically every day brings us the story of a neighborhood quarrel over a line fence. One party refuses to build his share, or the other party claims that what his neighbor builds is not strong enough to hold the stock. Sometimes one party is a gardener, without any stock at all, while the other man may be a draftsman with a large herd of cattle. Naturally the gardener cannot see why he should be compelled to go to the expense of keeping his neighbor's cattle enclosed. There are many of these troubles. The following synopsis is made law in relation to line fences, and we would like to see the last authority in these line fence troubles. The law states that by virtue of their offices, they are the fence viewers of the town, and they are the local authorities who are to settle these fence troubles.

The law states that each owner of two adjoining tracts of land shall make and maintain a just and equitable portion of the division fence between such lands. This is unless they can agree to make some other division, or else agree to let both of said lands lie open. The latter would follow in cases where very little live stock was kept, but unless there is such agreement the fence must be maintained, and each party must have our people keep it for reference, as it will prevent much private correspondence.

First of all, 't be it understood that a fair share of it.

The law further provides that when disputes arise between the owners of two of these fence viewers may act speaking, a legal fence is one which will turn the common stock kept in that neighborhood or county. For instance, in a dairy country this would mean a strong fence that would hold cattle. In a case where some farmer put in a flock of sheep, it would not be fair to expect his neighbors to pay for the cost of building an expensive sheep fence, when a much cheaper fence would hold their cattle. In such a case it would probably be best that the owner of the sheep would be obliged to keep the extra fence to keep in his stock, and if the sheep went through the cattle fence and caused damage on the land of the neighbor, the owner of the sheep would be responsible for that damage, and would be obliged to pay for it.

PROTECT FRUIT TREES FROM MICE.

(Experimental Farm Note.)

Thousands of trees are injured in Canada every year by mice, and in the newer districts a large number by rabbits also. All this could be prevented if the farmer or fruit grower would use the information available and protect his trees from mice. Some years there is less injury than others, and this fact leads to carelessness, and when a bad year comes the trees are unprotected.

While the deprivations from mice and rabbits in winter vary from one year to another, depending on the scarcity or abundance of food, the number of mice which are in the vicinity, and the character of the winter, the injury is always greatest when the orchard is in sod, and when there is rubbish lying about, hence the latter should be removed before the winter-sets in. As mice may be expected in greater or less numbers every winter, young trees should be regularly protected against their ravages. Mice usually begin working on the ground under the snow, and when they come to a tree they will begin to gnaw it if it is not protected. A small mound of soil from eight to twelve inches in height raised about the base of the tree will often prevent their injuring the tree, and even snow is effective, but the cheapest and surest practice is to wrap the tree with ordinary building paper, the price of which is small. Tar paper is also effective, but trees have been injured by using it, and it is well to guard against this when building paper will do as well. After the paper is wrapped around the tree and tied, a little earth should be put about the lower end to prevent the mice from reaching to work there on, if they get a way. It may be stated, however, that among several thousand young trees which have been wrapped with building paper for years at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, there have been practically no instances where the mice have gnawed through the paper to get at the tree. The use of a wire protector, or one made of tin or galvanized iron, is economical in the end, as they are durable.

There are a number of washes and poisons recommended for the protection of fruit trees and rabbits, but none of these is very satisfactory, as if the mice or rabbits are numerous, the poison has not sufficient effect upon them to prevent injury altogether. The following method of poisoning has been found fairly successful for
