LAND NOT SOLD.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—The report that the Saskatchewan Valley Land Company, purchased another large tract of land from the Dominion Government is officially denied in the Department of the Interior. According to a despatch, this Colonizing Company secured over a million acres at from \$3.50 to \$4 an acre, in a territory comprising valuable farm lands, that will be worth \$10 or \$20 after the Railway extensions are completed.
