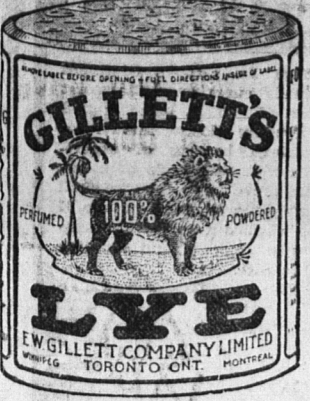

CZAR NICHOLAS PRESIDES AT CONFERENCE

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Sept. 5.—A Petrograd despatch to Reuters Telegram Company says: President yesterday at the first meeting of a special conference having for its object the discussion of measures to be taken for national defence of the Empire, Emperor Nicholas declared: "The question before the conference is of the gravest importance. It concerns the more speedy equipment of the army with munitions, which is the one object for which our valiant troops wait in order to stop the foreign invasion and bring success to our arms. Parliament has given me resolutely without the least hesitation the only reply worthy of Russia, the reply which I expected

from it, namely, war until victorious. I doubt not that this is the voice of the whole Russian nation."
