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SAINT JOHN MAN DIES SUDDENLY

Thomas White, Well-Known Citizen Dies on Train Returning from Europe - Teacher Ejected From School By Police

St. JOHN, August 26.-(Special)-The death occurred last night of Thomas White, one of St. John's oldest and most honored citizens. Mr. White had been rather poorly for some time with a weak heart, and accompanied by Mrs. White went over to St. John to recuperate. During the return ocean voyage he was quite ill after arriving in Canada and expired on the train when near Sherbrooke. The police were summoned this morning to eject former Principal Allingham at the Tower School and make room for a new man. Mr. Allingham had been dismissed, but claims the contract was violated. He will bring suit to enforce what he claims are his rights in the case.

LEADER BORDEN IN SAINT JOHN

Speaks to Large And Approving Audience In Opera House, Attended By Electors of Both Parties - Various Opinions of the Meeting

St. JOHN, August 26.-(Special) Messrs Borden and Bergeron arrived this afternoon by boat from Digby and were met at the wharf by a band and members of the Borden Club. They were heartily cheered and were driven to the homes of W H Thorne and J Douglas Hazen respectively. His speech was devoted to a presentation of the platform laid down at Halifax and a discussion of its various items together with an exposition of the alleged wrong doing of the Government. The Opera House had been decorated for the occasion by a committee. There was a large array of citizens on the platform which had been seated for 200 and was fully occupied. Mr. Borden spoke with animation and was well received by the large audience. His speech was devoted to a presentation of the platform laid down at Halifax and a discussion of its various items together with an exposition of the alleged wrong doing of the Government. Messrs Borden and Bergeron will leave St. John for the west by the 11 o'clock train tomorrow to catch the Ocean Limited train on the I. C. R. at Newcastle. Many citizens of both parties attended the meeting, which Conservatives think was very successful, while critical Liberals say it contains "nothing new." The meeting derived additional interest from being delivered on the eve of the bye-election campaign to fill the seat vacated by the death of Dr. Stockton, M. P.

PACIFIC COAST LIBERALS OBJECT

To Japanese Immigration and Pass Strong Resolution Demanding that Ottawa Government to Restrict it at Once

VANCOUVER, August 25.-(Special)-The Liberal Association of this city has passed a strong resolution urging the Dominion Government to take action in the matter of Oriental immigration. After recounting the circumstances of the Coast, the impossibility of such dissimilar races ever fusing, the advantage held by Oriental labor against white, the apparent collusion of the Japanese Association of this city with Japanese officials if not the Japanese Government and the manifested indifference by Canadians in the east it was resolved most earnestly: To request and demand that the Dominion Government immediately take steps to restrict this dangerous and undesirable immigration.

PAID HUNDREDS INSTEAD OF FIFTIES

WINNIPEG, Aug. 24 - The teller of the Bank of Montreal here paid out five hundred dollars too much. Sim Patrakos, a Greek, is under arrest charged with having obtained the money. Patrakos presented a cheque for \$500. Teller W. J. Raphey claims that he unwittingly gave Patrakos ten one hundred dollar bills and thirty fives thinking he was giving him fifties instead of hundreds. Patrakos denied that he had the extra money and the bank placed him under arrest. Patrakos pleaded not guilty and was remanded for eight days.

KILLED WIFE SHOT HIMSELF

NEW YORK, Aug. 24. - Taking aim over the sleeping form of his daughter, Margaret, four years old, Bernard Delaney last night shot and mortally wounded his wife as she lay asleep in bed. He then shot and killed himself. The screams of little Margaret awakened Timothy Delaney, a brother of the dead man, who slept in a room nearby. He called an ambulance from the hospital and Mrs. Delaney was janitor in the sixth army regiment. He had been drinking heavily since the fourth of July and had acted queerly of late.

MOROCCAN BANDIT CHANGES HIS MIND

LONDON, Aug. 25. - It is understood that Raisuli, the bandit who is holding Ould Sidi Harry Melman a prisoner, has sent a communication to the British government in which he agrees to modify his previous demands for the release of the Ould. The only condition he makes now is that his own life and the lives of the members of his family be guaranteed. He makes no suggestion in or other concessions.

FAILED TO MAKE APPOINTMENTS

The Cabinet Agreed on Pugsley But Cannot Agree on Ontario Minister - Graham is Wanted in the Provincial Field.

OTTAWA, August 26 (Special) - The Cabinet meeting today failed again to settle the appointment of the new ministers. It is understood that Dr. Pugsley is certain but that it is the filling of the Ontario vacancy is causing delay. Some Ontario Liberals are objecting to Graham's removal from provincial politics.

WAS SENSITIVE AND SUICIDED

LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 24 - Paul A. Barth, for a year and a half mayor of Louisville, and ousted recently by the decision of the court of appeals, shot and killed himself yesterday. Mr. Barth ended his life in his private office at the headquarters of the United Lime Company, of which he was general manager. Since the ousting of Mr. Barth's administration by the court of appeals, two months ago, the acts of the officials during his term have been subjected to severe scrutiny by the governor. Nothing was found that reflected any discredit on Mr. Barth personally, but the methods of conducting some of the city institutions have been under fire both in official reports and in the press. Mr. Barth was very sensitive to criticism and his friends at times regarded that the condition of affairs seemed to gail him.

PLAYED INDIAN ONE IS DEAD

EVERETT, Mass., August 25. - While a number of boys were playing "Indian" here yesterday afternoon, Daniel Walburn, aged 12 years, was shot and so horribly injured that he died on his way to a hospital. LONGWORTH HAD LAUGH AT WIFE

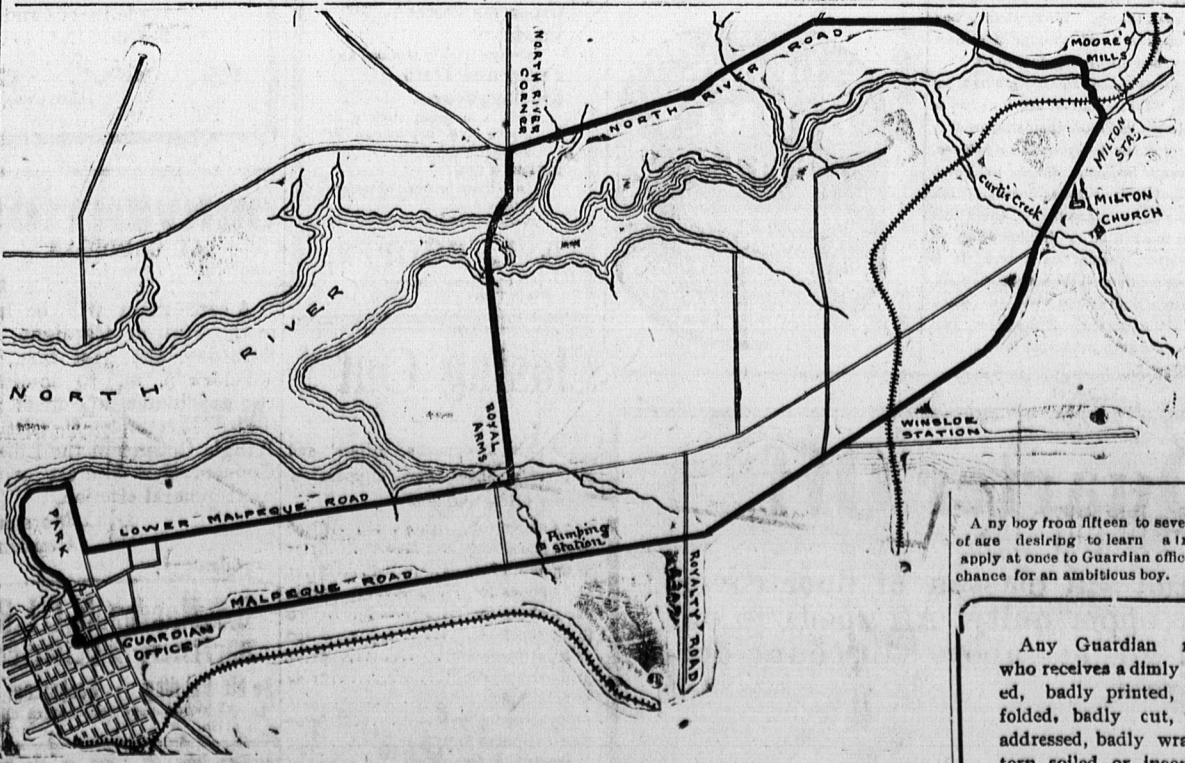
