the question as to the admissibility of women for appointment to the Senate of Canada must be governed by the interpretation to be placed upon the provisions of the B. N. A. Act, 1867, and in particular those provisions of the Act which relate to the constitution of the Senate and the qualifications of the members of the Senate. These are, sections 17, and 20-36 inclusive. They argue that the phrase "qualified persons" in sec. 24 is to be interpreted in the sense it bore, according to the intent of the Imperial Parliament when the Act was passed. That what it meant then it means today. Its legal construction has not been extended and cannot be influenced by recent innovations touching the political status of women, or by the more liberal conception of the sphere of women in politics and social life which may, perhaps, now be assumed to prevail. Regard must be had to the state of the law in England and Canada when the Act of 1867 was passed and to the antecedent situation in the several provinces which the Act united in one Dominion. After dealing with the political position of women under the common law, it was then argued that even if the decisions of various leading cases cited, chiefly Viscount Rhondda's case, are taken into account, there is no ground for the assumption that the word "persons" contemplated female persons. It was argued that the decisions cited afford strong authority for the view that the framers of the B. N. A. Act cannot be presumed to have intended in the absence of clear expression of such an intention to modify the English common law by conferring upon women the legal capacity or qualification to be appointed to a place in the Senate of Canada; and to render women eligible to sit in the Canadian Upper House, though excluded from the British House of Lords. When Parliament intends to remove a legal disability existing under the common law, it does so by express language, as was done in the case of the Sex Disqualification (Removal) Act 1919, and the Representation of the People Act, 1918. It is then generally submitted that the opinion expressed by the law officers of the Crown upon the question of the power of the Governor General to summon female persons to the Senate of Canada was correct and the English common law that the question referred ought, accordingly, to be answered in the negative. The Deputy Attorney General of Quebec, C. Lanctot, K. C., argued that the points made on behalf of the Crown with regard to the appointment of women to the Senate of Canada were of interest to the Province of Quebec because it alone of the provinces still has an Upper House. Women are still excluded therefrom and so it is assumed that if women are held eligible for appointment to the Senate of Canada they will also be eligible for appointment to the Legislative Council of Quebec. N. Wesley Rowell, K. C., appeared for a certain group of petitioners who are interested in the admission of women to the Senate of Canada. His argument is that there is nothing in the word "persons" to suggest that it is limited to male per-

Father And Son Banquet At Montague
 A most delightful evening was spent in the Christian Church Hall, Montague, Friday, March 16th, when the Trail Rangers and Tuxis Boys of Montague entertained their fathers together with the boys of Kilmuir and their dads at a Father and Son Banquet. It is the first time that such a banquet has ever been held in Montague, and everyone present felt a steeper tie between fathers and sons.
 After six score guests had been very generously served by the ladies of Montague, Mr. H. H. Simpson called the guests to order and after a short address called upon Mr. Allison McLean to lead the sing song, in which everyone joyfully took part. When the singing had played its part with those who had shown such a delight in gastronomy, a complete toast list was carried out with Jack McLean acting as Toast Master and Tuxis Boys of Montague as Toasters. Mr. Allison McLean rendered a very beautiful solo, and Mr. D. P. McPherson in a fine address explained the meaning and purpose of the Kite Tuxis Square at Kilmuir.
 The special speaker for the evening was the Hon. Willard Picketts, Minister of Intellectual Life in the Maritime Tuxis Boys Parliament. Mr. Picketts in beginning his address on the importance of the Boys Work, said he was glad to have the opportunity of speaking to the fathers and their sons, the fathers who stand for the present and their sons who are the only hope of the future. The very fact that the young people are the only hope for the future makes the boys work wonderfully important. It is important as a training for service, because every boy was put into the world to serve, they should realize this purpose, and every one should realize that whatever his life work is, if it is a calling of God, it is high indeed, and it is worthy of everything he can put into it. Canada is calling today for men that will "throw" themselves with all their strength and lives into the service of their country, men who have caught a vision, and who have when boys, put Christ in the center of their lives, as the Trail Rangers and Tuxis Boys are doing. He spoke of education as a great means of service, but said that too many used their education to make an easy living for themselves and were willing to take more out of the community than they were putting into it. We must have intelligence plus. Since the

boys are laying life foundations, it is important to see that the foundations are four square, to see that the boys increase, as Luke says of Jesus, "in wisdom and stature, and in favour with God and man. After going into particulars on each side of the Boys foundation programme, the speaker urged the fathers to help the boys in every way possible, and he closed a wonderful oration by bringing a special message to the boys.
