### Protecting Britain's Birds

Were it not for the vigilance of a dozen or two keen-eyed men with a pair of field-glasses always handy, a good many British birds would become scarcer than they are already. Their eggs, which will fetch a few pence or shillings apiece, are the frequent spoil of looters.

Some of the watchers are volunteers and some are paid a small retainer fee by natural history societies and landowners who wish to protect the diminishing fauna of Great Britain.

Most of the posts are lonely, the remotest being the hut on the cliff of Henna, the northern-most cape of the Shetland Isle of Unst. For five months every year the late Mr. Edwards used to take up his quarters there, becoming meanwhile the most northerly resident of the British Isles. Once a week his daughter brought him newspapers and food.

The neighboring nesting colony of the great skua was the object of his watch and had been for forty years. When he accepted the charge some years ago, egg looters had so reduced the colony that only five pairs nested. This spring about two hundred and fifty pairs nested on the Ness itself and many more on Foula and various uninhabited rocky islets in the seas of the vicinity.

Four watches usually guard the long seaward spit of shingle at Dungeness, where breed the rare Kentish plover and other scarce birds. This plover goes one better. It makes no nest at all for its three pale brown, streaked and spotted eggs, which harmonize wonderfully with the pebbles of the shingle.

The Farne Isles, off the coast of Northumberland, are another well-

watched sanctuary, where myriads of terns, puffins, razorbills, gullies, and other seabirds are looked after during the breeding season.

Protected by watchers, too, is the colony of terns or sea swallows that nest here and there along the Ainsdale dunes in Lancashire, for a distance of some three miles. The rannets on Lundy were actually exterminated by egg looters. But the species is being well looked after in other of its British breeding haunts.

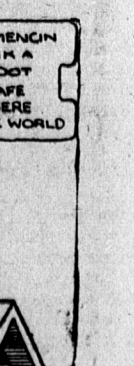
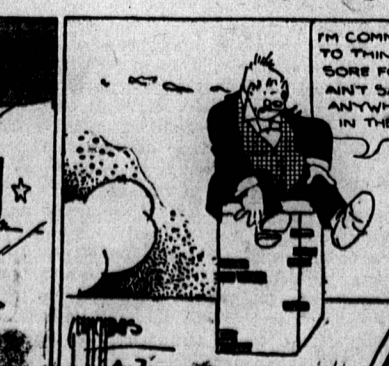
