All should see "May Blossom," at the Opera House, (Charlottetown) tonight.
Glucos, the Percheron, stallion, will be at P. B. Hughes, Shamrock, from April 27th to May 2nd.
Rev. S. J. McArthur, who has been ill at Newcastle, N. B., for several weeks with an abscess in the forehead, is at Charlottetown, for treatment in the Prince Edward Island Hospital.
Mrs. A. E. Williams and family, Moncton, well known in Charlottetown, accompanied by Mrs. Williams' sister, Miss Dunbar, have left for Guelph, Ont., to spend the summer with Mrs. Williams' parents.
The Ottawa government has decided to commute to life imprisonment the sentence of Tony Garrio, condemned to death at Sydney for the murder of Lewis McLaren, of this province. The evidence showed that there had been provocation for the killing.
William H. MacEwen of New Dominion, West River, has received word of the death of his sister's husband, Capt. Walter H. MacKie, at Los Angeles, California, which occurred on Monday April 15, 1912. Capt. MacKie was born at Rocky Point, P. E. I. He was married in January 1889, to Miss Eleanor Elizabeth MacEwen, daughter of the late David MacEwen of West River. Though not in robust health for some time the news of his sudden death came as a shock to his friends.
The attention of the members of the Royal Orange Association of Prince Edward Island is called to the fact that the report of the proceedings of the recent Grand Lodge Sessions has passed the printers and that the General Secretary, Brother Albert J. Phillips, Summerside, has mailed copies to all entitled. It is important that all primary Lodge members make themselves acquainted with the same, especially as many brethren were prevented from attending through disorganization of railway travelling from snowstorm.
Herring fishing on the North Side of the Province is reported good, all the fishermen being successful with splendid catches and the bait supply for lobster fishing is assured. The lobster factory of George Carver, Charlottetown, situated at Cavendish was never in better shape to handle a large seasons catch. Many extra boats have been placed in his fleet of lobster crafts. Mr. Carver invented a new device to secure the meat from legs of all large lobsters. In the past this meat has gone to waste, but with this new machine, built by Messrs. Bruce Stewart Co. Ltd., under the instructions of the inventor, there will be little meat go to waste in this particular factory. It will be remembered that this is the only factory in the world that manufactures the famous "rarebit" and up to the present Mr. Carver has orders on hand for over one hundred cases. This season the "rarebit" will contain the meat secured from large legs of the lobster, which no doubt, will tend to give it a more delicate flavor.
An exchange says that the importation of European potatoes into Canada has alarmed agriculturalists in Prince Edward Island. They fear that a disease known as "potato canker" may be introduced. In moving a resolution that steps should be taken for the proper inspection of imported potatoes, a member of the P. E. I. Legislature said: "The disease known as the potato canker is spreading in England, where it has been known for some years. It is spreading with alarming rapidity in Newfoundland, having been introduced into that colony from Europe. It must inevitably come to Canada unless the most energetic measures are taken to prevent its introduction. It is very liable to come from Maine to New Brunswick. If it gets into this island it will undoubtedly mean the ruin of our potato culture. There is no remedy yet known for it. The spores of the disease are carried into the field by infected seed and thence infect the soil, and it takes at least six years to eradicate the pest from the soil, during which potatoes cannot be grown. The disease may also be spread by the use of bags and other packages, which have held diseased potatoes. The most energetic measures are necessary immediately to cope with this most serious situation."
