## IF YOU THINK YOU HAVE A CANCER

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It was while I was chief of the Bureau that we began a campaign to eliminate as far as possible these secret and deceptive remedies. A very considerable success has been obtained by proceeding against the manufacturers and vendors of these preparations. Under the law a simple fine is all that can be imposed for the first offense. Conviction is not possible for advertising but only for misbranding; that is by claiming virtues that do not exist. We had while I was Chief of the Bureau and since that time others have had much better results by smoking through the Post Office Department.

As cancer has increased in frequency and fatality unethical and misleading advertisements have become more common. The remedies may not produce any very great harmful results, but they do one thing. They put off the day when the patient consults a physician and surgeon. This delay is often fatal. If the campaign which is now going on in the study of cancer could do that one thing, namely suppress all this advertising of cancer cures to the laity it would accomplish a world of good for humanity.

### Diet in Cancer

It would not be quite fair to close this article without a word respecting the diet. There is no specific diet which will tend to prevent cancer, and nothing in the way of diet which directly tends to cure it, but it is evident that a diet which is simple and keeps the body in the best possible condition is the one which would be most useful in cancer. The diet should be so ordered as to avoid constipation, securing at least one and better two evacuations of the bowels daily and at stated times and also avoid any tendency to overload the body with any element of food not necessary for sustenance.

Particular care should be taken toward limiting the amount of meat, fish, fowl and eggs and other high protein foods. All cell proliferation cannot go on without the aid of protein in the food is an evident means of avoiding too rapid nutrition of the cells. I would urge those who wish to protect themselves against cancer to eat fruit and vegetables freely and meat, fish fowl and eggs sparingly. For best results the bread and breakfast foods should be made from whole ground unbolting cereals. The intake of lime and other minerals should not be neglected and milk is the ideal food for lime.

The physician in charge may have some special rules in diet and these, of course should be followed. All I have said above simply indicates the kind of diet which will assist nature in resisting the inroads of this disease and assist the surgeon and physician in their efforts to exterminate it.

### THE CANADIAN FORESTS

Canada possesses at least 50,000,000 acres of old burned forest areas that are reproducing the commercial softwood species entirely by natural methods in sufficient quantity to assure a future timber crop. These areas should be segregated by the various Provinces and be given intensive fire protection and eventually managed under silvicultural methods. They could be created into forest reserves and they would be reserves indeed. Here we have over 50,000,000 acres as a free gift of Nature well stocked with young trees only waiting adequate fire protection and intelligent guidance by the mind of man to supply for all time not only the wood-using needs of Canada, but those of the whole Empire as well. The challenge is to Canadian business sagacity, to Canadian citizenship and above all to Imperial patriotism.

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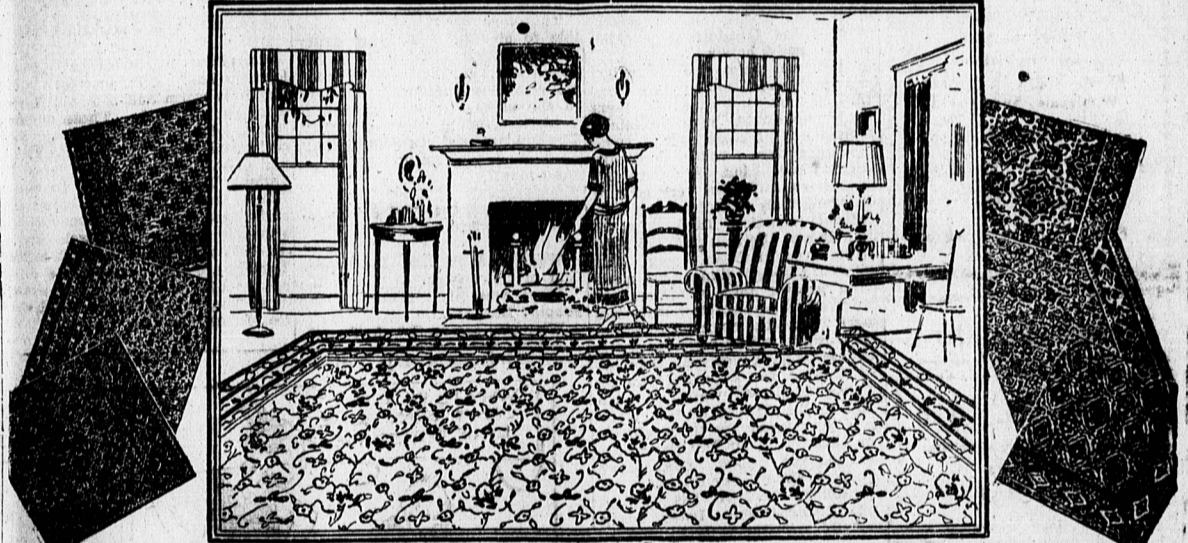

600 acres have been burned and are now covered with young growth of some kind. It is safe to say that one-half the area is covered with second growth of commercial species. This gives us the enormous area of 30,000,000 acres. The Rocky Mountain Forest Reserve in Alberta contains 13,000,000 acres and 10,000 of this is covered with young growth of marketable species below commercial size. The Forestry Branch made a reconnaissance survey of 10,000,000 acres in Alberta in the Smoky River region and it found 6,000,000 acres reproducing softwood species in potentially commercial quantities.
