"Homes is the little world in which the duties of the great world are daily rehearsed. A nation can rise no higher than its homes. If we are to have non-delinquent children, we must first have non-delinquent parents," he said.—Link and Visitor.

I RENOUNCE LIQUOR

A Sermon preached June 3, 1945 by Rev. W. Burton Crowe

"At the last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." —Prov. 23:32

I make an apology today for taking up your time with a discussion of the liquor problem. It is well known that there are few departments of life—moral, political or social—that there are few functions of the human body which are not substantially improved and brightened once they have been tainted by alcohol.

Someone has said, "The liquor traffic is indicted at the bar of humanity as an enemy of the human race." In that statement every intelligent and unbiased mind must concur. The liquor traffic is one of the greatest evils of our time. It has destroyed bodies and souls of a vast number of men and women and has visited misery upon millions of homes.

A few years ago, the Christian Century, dealing with the results of the repeal of the United States Prohibition Law, said: "The real talk of strict regulation of what everybody recognizes to be a dangerous and demoralizing trade, after all the promises of reducing the amount of drinking, saving the young from debauchery, and conquering crime, the boom situation is today worse than it has ever been within the memory of living man. What can we do about this public morale like a pestilence? These words describe conditions not only in the United States but in Nova Scotia.

Last year legitimate liquor sales in Canada amounted to approximately \$39.00 for every man, woman, child, and infant in the country. Figure that out for your family—\$39.00 for each member. Did you give that much to the Church of God, to the character building institutions, to the charities which are attempting to create manhood that is honorable and a community life that is clean? Who makes liquor their god gave an average of \$60.00 (assuming that half of Canada is sober) to their god? How much did you give to yours?

A judge who sits in our divorce court says that the great majority of cases that come before him involve liquor; divorce is on the increase in Ontario. The nine years our population increased by 92 per cent; in the same period the percentage of prisoners who admitted using liquor increased by 184 per cent, just double that of the increase in the number of prisoners.

If the world of tomorrow, about which we are hearing so much these days, is to be a world of decency and order, freedom and democracy, it must have solid foundations in the characters of men and women. This means that there are some trades that must be cleaned, some outrages that must be stopped, some pitfalls that must be closed. What can we do about this sordid business, this ruinous waste, this author of vice, misery, and lawlessness? Fortunately we are not helpless; there are several things you and I can do.

—You can discourage in every way possible the serving and use of liquor among your friends and associates. You can refuse to be a part of the disease, but move over into the cure instead. As a part of the cure you may be ridiculed but this should not matter; did not Jesus say, "Blessed are they who are persecuted for righteousness' sake?" Are you willing to endure ridicule, and even persecution, if need be, that we may have a more sober and righteous Canada? Are you willing to endure abuse and persecution in a fight for the elimination of booze from the list of weapons used by your political party to win elections or would you prefer to see your party secure the few extra votes booze can be relied upon to buy?

"I renounce liquor because the liquor trade has always stood for everything that decency was opposed to and has fought everything decency desired."

"I renounce liquor because the liquor trade is a godless institution; I renounce liquor because every person who, by example, or by acquiescence, patronizes this foul saboteur is in the employ of hell, because on the one hand we can have this monstrous thing, or on the other hand we can have Christ, but we cannot have both." Illustration Stations

Some sixty years ago, in 1885 to be exact, Canada faced the necessity of re-casting her agriculture. In Eastern Canada the outmoded practices followed were found to be inefficient. The nascent west was facing problems entirely new. Far sighted men clearly foresaw that Canada's future as a nation depended very heavily on the necessity of agriculture being on a permanent progressive basis. With this purpose definitely in mind, the Experimental Farm Services were initiated. Today they have stretched across the Dominion and have the services of many experienced, capable workers. In the intervening sixty years there has been gathered an immense amount of valuable information. They also have to hand the results of work of innumerable highly skilled personnel in the United States Bureau of Agriculture.

Thirty years ago it appeared that this necessary information was not as readily available to the average farmer as might be desired. In addition there existed a number of items of an entirely local nature which were outside the usual scope of the then established centres. There also existed the fact that results, as obtained when tested under carefully controlled conditions as existed on the Experimental Farms, might vary when attempted under ordinary farm conditions. To meet these problems an Illustration Station was established. An Illustration Station is simply an ordinary farm worked under the owner's supervision. On these farms careful selection of seed is made, careful cultural methods followed and every effort is made to have each Station a model to be copied by neighbours. On these Illustration Stations an immense amount of information has been gathered concerning suitable varieties of cereals, forage crops and garden crops. There has been a considerable amount of work carried through on insect and plant disease control, methods, crop rotations and fertility studies.

This information has been gathered for the farmer. It is made up not only of local studies but also includes findings all across Canada. Each year a Field Day is held on each Illustration Station at which time an opportunity is presented to discuss farm work in the above light and talk over new problems. The farmers are able to look over new varieties of cereals and see what advantages exist in the new strains. There is an opportunity to look over fertilized pastures and decide on the most economical application which will best fill his own particular needs. There is a very fine occasion thus presented to meet men in the various agricultural services and to discuss individual problems with them and with their own neighbours.

The two hundred Illustration Stations located across Canada have had a record of performance to date. Only the continued interest of the vitally interested public is necessary to make their future equally effective.

BUILDING CONSTRUCTION WORKERS MUST REGISTER

if not now Employed in the Construction Industry.

By Order of the Minister of Labour, made under National Selective Service Civilian Regulations, certain workers experienced in the construction industry must register on one of the days from the 6th to the 11th of August, 1945.

Those required to register include all male persons who:

- (a) are either skilled or unskilled building construction tradesmen or labourers, and who are not now engaged in building construction work; and
- (b) have had a total of at least two years experience, continuous or otherwise, in the construction industry since December 31st, 1936; and
- (c) have passed their 16th birthday but have not yet reached their 65th birthday.

Workers at present employed on building construction are not required to register under this special registration.

Registration shall be made—

1. At the nearest Local Employment Office of the National Employment Service; or
2. At the nearest Post Office if a person does not live in a city or town in which a Local Office of the National Employment Service is located, nor within 5 miles of such a city or town.

Home construction is vital to the welfare of Canada.

Returning veterans must have living accommodation.

Experienced building construction workers—whether tradesmen or labourers—are urgently required.

If you are a construction worker not now working in the construction industry, you must register as here stated—but you should do more. You should offer your services immediately for transfer to the construction industry, so that you may help in providing the homes so urgently needed.

Local Employment Offices will be open Evenings till 9:00 p.m. to take registrations, from Monday, Aug. 6th to Friday, Aug. 10th.
