Dick Wakefield Is Best-Known '43 Rookie

NEW YORK, April 15 (AP)—One result of baseball's shortened spring training season has been that little has been heard of the rookie marvels the Major League clubs used to unveil in the south. Their number is fewer this year, but they are present none-the-less and the competition for honors as "rookie of the year" seems likely to be as spirited as ever.

The best-known newcomer, perhaps, is Dick Wakefield of Detroit. He has achieved considerable fame by auctioning his services around the Major Leagues till the Tigers finally signed him for approximately \$57,600.

From the University of Michigan he went to Detroit's Piedmont league farm at Winston-Salem in 1941 and last year was promoted to Beaumont in the Texas League, where he proceeded to win the batting championship with a .346 average, making 192 hits, scoring 100 runs and batting in 90. It followed naturally that he also was named the league's most valuable player.

There is a question, though, about how well Wakefield can field and also how long he may continue among the big leagues. He is single, but thus far has been celerated because of his batting.

The outstanding National League rookie appears to be infielder Eddie Stanly of Chicago Cubs, who was the batting champion and most valuable player in the American Association last year at Milwaukee.

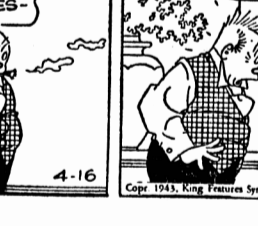
