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SOVIET GOVERNMENT'S REPLY TO BRITAIN

Agrees to Consider Armistice and Shares in British Hope for Permanent Peace.

LONDON, July 10.—A Stockholm dispatch to the Labor Herald, carried the text of the Russian Soviet government's note accepting the British proposal for peace between Great Britain. The Soviet government agrees to the British plan. The note, it is said, agrees to consider an armistice to be concluded between Russia and Great Britain and shares the British Government's expectation that this armistice may pave the way to ward a definite peace. At the same time the Soviet government wishes to protest that it has not attacked

He admitted, officers said, that he planned a "framed-up" robbery with the man he killed, on the same occasion in the door way of their home. He was also quoted as saying that he had "tired of married life and decided to return to the easy life of the army."

Soldiers' Monument Unveiled at New London

Thursday afternoon was a memorable one in the history of New London North. In the presence of about 1,500 people a monument was unveiled to the memory of the men in this district who had made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. The monument is a fine one of which any community might feel proud of, and has upon it the names of Pte. Archie Campbell, 6th C.N. Rifles, Gr. Arthur P. Johnstone, 2nd Can. Siege Battery, Pte. Leslie W. McLeod, 105 Can. Batt. Lieut. Norwood McLeod, R.F.C., Sgt. F. Vernon Lynds, 105 Can. Batt. Battery, Gr. Harold A. McLeod, 8. Can. Siege Battery, Frank R. McKenzie, P.P.C.L.I., Pte. Robert Adams, 25 Can. Batt. The site chosen for this memorial stone is the historic grounds of the church dedicated to the memory of Dr. John Geddie, the pioneer foreign Missionary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Within the church is an interesting tablet to the memory of this heroic man. To heroism and sacrifice the stone without and the tablet within will make the common enduring appeal, kindling the smallest spark to the tribute flame. The unveiling ceremony was presided over by the Rev. George Miller and addresses filled with the spirit of the departed brave men and delivered in an earnest effort to preserve and perpetuate that spirit were delivered by Chaplain Major the Rev. G. C. Taylor, Col. R. H. Campbell, Major D. A. McKinnon, Sgt. Sydney Bonnell, Judge Warburton, and Ex-Lieut. Governor D.A. McKinnon. 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A FATAL ACCIDENT AT CLYDE RIVER

Mr. William Scott an Aged and Respected Resident Met Instant Death When Thrown from Carriage Saturday Afternoon.

Mr. William Scott, a well-known and highly respected old resident of Clyde River and a brother of Mr. Jacob Scott of this city, met with a sad death on Saturday afternoon. He was driving with his little grand-daughter, about 15 years of age, from the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. Colin Fraser, with whom he lived to the home of Mr. Robert MacPhail, New Haven, when the harness on the horse got loose and the animal started to run. Mr. Scott, who was 80 years of age, was powerless to exercise any control over the animal and when the carriage struck the bridge at Clyde River he was thrown from the carriage and killed. The little girl was not thrown out and succeeded in getting control of the horse before it had gone much further.
