CHARLOTTETONIAN BURIED IN SNOW

Beneath a Great Snowslide which Overtook Him—Friends Found the Body.

Slocan City, B. C., received quite a shock on Friday January 20th, by the word sent down from the Speculator that it was feared Joe Dolron had either been lost or caught in a snowslide. Within half an hour from the receipt of the news a large party of men were on their way up the Creek to search for the missing man, followed during that night and next day by every available man in town. The news was sent down by Al. Reeves, watchman at the Arlington who suspected something was amiss.

On the previous Tuesday afternoon when the Speculator shut down Joe who had been working at that mine passed the Arlington on ski with the intention of making the Black Prince that night. Friday morning Reeves who had noticed that a big slide had come down on the south side of Springer Creek, at the Regina claim, became somewhat alarmed and went up to the Prince and found that Joe had not arrived. Thinking that perhaps he might have gone to some other claim Reeves and Leo Dolron, a brother of the missing man, journeyed to the Bank of England thence over the hill to the Hampton and across to the Speculator, finding no trace of Joe. Then the alarm was given and it was felt certain the poor fellow had been caught in the Regina slide. The two men journeyed on down to the Arlington and there met the men from the Black Prince. The ski marks of the missing man were followed to the slide, but there all traces were lost.

That night the men worked diligently by lantern light to find some trace of Joe, being joined next day by all the men from the Bank of England, Ottawa and other properties until there were 62 men at one time employed. Saturday morning many of the men sounded with iron rods while others shovelled. At 11 o'clock a piece of a ski was found about 300 feet below the slide buried under the snow and later on a second piece was discovered farther down.

Sunday morning the men worked on the slide below where the ski was found, and at 9 o'clock were rewarded by finding Joe's body, which was on its back with the arms frozen in an upright position as if to ward off the snow. One rubber was missing beside the ski. Death must have been instantaneous, deceased's head having struck a tree or log as the back of the skull and neck was severely bruised. The body was found on the west bank of the Lily B. Creek and at the edge of the slide with about two feet of snow covering it. Another few feet and Joe would have been safe. The slide was fully a quarter of a mile wide and travelled for nearly a mile. It had caught Joe unawares in the dusk of the evening and he had no chance of

escape. The body was brought down town and placed in the residence of his brother-in-law, Con. Murphy where loving friends took charge of it. The funeral took place on Tuesday morning Rev. Father Jeannotte officiating. The Miners Union of which deceased was a member, had charge of the arrangements, and that organization and a large concourse of people escorted the remains to the grave. Deceased was one of the most popular young men in the city as well as in the camp having been here for years, and was a general favorite with all. His sudden and terrible death shocked the whole community. His relatives here are Leo Dolron, a brother and Mrs. Con. Murphy, a sister; beside his mother Mrs. John McDonald in Summerdale P. E. I. brother William J. (Blacksmith of Charlottetown and Albert of Halifax, N. S. to whom the sympathies of all are extended. Too much credit cannot be given those who participated in the search for the body, hard work and long hours being counted as naught in the performance of what each felt to be a duty. No braver or nobler class of men exist than those to be found in a western mining camp for they are ever ready to help a comrade in distress or to risk their lives to rescue another from the danger.
