Dodgers Defeat Giants As Gate Receipts Are Given To Navy Relief Society

BROOKLYN, May 8—(AP)—One of the most extraordinary games in major league history played at twilight before a record crowd of 43,822 fans who contributed \$50,000 to the Navy Relief Society, brought Brooklyn Dodgers a 7-6 triumph over New York Giants today.

Whitlow Wyatt, the outstanding pitcher of the National League a year ago, lasted past the first inning for the first time in three games and went on to attain his first victory of the season, although he couldn't finish. In the third inning the Dodgers hit four successive singles without scoring because Wyatt was trapped going from first to third. But with the bases loaded Johnny Rizzo hit a ringing double for two runs and the National League champions, supposedly weak against left-handers, went on to knock Cliff Melton out of the box and score four runs in this frame.

And in the fourth inning the Dodgers stormed to two more runs. One of them coming home when Manager Mel Ott of the Giants made a tremendous throw from right field and the ball hit catcher Hank Danning on the head and

Athletes At War

TORONTO, May 8—(CP)—Much of the sting is taken out of the clamor against imported athletes by the real Canadianism shown by such excellent examples as Bob Fritz. Fritz was brought to Winnipeg in 1935 as part of a program to build a Canadian championship rugby football club. The program was a success, with Fritz, one of the greatest plunging backs in the game, the team's coach. A few years later he left Winnipeg for Edmonton, where he coached football, announced a radio program and became physical director at the University of Alberta. A couple of weeks ago Fritz joined the R.C.A.F. as a gunner. "That makes his adoption of Canadian complete," says the writer.

Here's another of the same: An All-American football star with University of Minnesota and one of the fastest hitting line-men ever to show on a Canadian gridiron when he helped Winnipeg Blue Bombers win the Canadian championship in 1935, Bert Oja is a captain in the Canadian Dental Corps, attached to the Royal Canadian Air Force at Brandon, Man. The Chinese on the other hand have sufficient resources to intensify guerrilla activities against the armies of occupation.

still Sparring in Canada. A crisis in the Russian situation must be rapidly approaching but so far there are no clear indications of the form the initial move will take. It is generally believed the High German effort will be made toward the Caucasus but rivers still swollen by melting snow may postpone major operations in the south. In any case it must be expected that later attacks on the Moscow front will be made to give protection to the left flank of the drive in the south. A simultaneous offensive on the whole length of the front such as Hitler launched last year seems improbable in view of demands made on German resources. It seems more likely the front will be divided into offensive and defensive sectors, varying as the situation develops.

LUFTWAFFE (Continued from page 3) they spotted us as we went in," he said. "They put up a wicked barrage. I attacked first, choosing what appeared to be the largest ship. "I dived to the deck and unloaded my bombs. Four landed smack on the ship's deck. As we flew clear there was a terrific flash." The rear gunner then reported that a huge column of water rose over the ship's stern and Brown said: "I think I must have blown the stern right off." "The other planes came in and each took a ship—all fair sized ships," said Brown. "In quick succession there were four bright orange flashes along the line of the convoy. Each flash meant a direct hit." Still other ships were hit in this and in a second attack several hours later. Because of the darkness the fliers claimed none of the ships was sunk, but a Beaufighter on patrol this morning sighted two seriously damaged vessels, one beached and the other still on fire with her deck almost awash, under tow of two tugs. All the Canadians returned safely but two other planes were lost.
