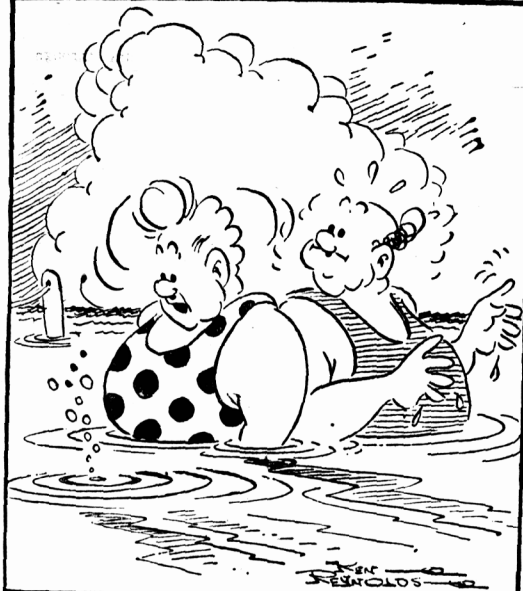

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Settlement Nears In Textile Strike

MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—In a move that might lead to an early settlement of the 88-day-old textile strike at the Valleyfield plant of Montreal Cottons Limited, the United Textile Workers of America (A.F.L.) tonight signified their unqualified acceptance of a settlement proposal made earlier today by G. Blair Gordon, company president.

Mr. Gordon wired Antonio Barrette, Quebec labor minister, that the company was willing to ask the Quebec regional war labor board for permission to make wages at its Valleyfield mill "compatible with wages current in other mills in Canada" at the first opportunity after the plant's reopening, and added that Montreal Cottons "will welcome cooperation of any labor organization claiming to represent employees at Valleyfield in making representations to the board."

"That the company agrees to present a joint petition with Local 100, U.T.W.A. to the regional war labor board for the same wage increases as those obtained at the Dominion Textile Mills at Montreal. This should be done 48 hours after the return to work. As previously stated, we ask assurances that a contract similar to those signed with Dominion Textiles at Montreal be arranged, with the exception that the work week should be 50 hours with time and a half after 46 hours."

The telegram claimed to represent all the Valleyfield Workers and was sent over the names of Treffe Leduc, president of the Valleyfield local of the union, and Macdonald Parent, acting Canadian director.

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Soviet Ambassador Applies For Visa

ATHENS, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Rear Admiral Konstantin K. Rodionov, Russian Ambassador to Greece, applied to the Greek Government today for a visa to enable him to leave the country. He did not request a return visa.

Stephanos Stephanopoulos, acting Greek Foreign Minister who had received Rodionov's action, said the Ambassador, who has served here only nine months, also asked to visit his wife and small daughter.

Although neither the Russian Embassy nor Stephanopoulos would comment on Rodionov's action, said to leave Greece, the incident recalled the departure of the Yugoslav Minister, Isidor Cankar, who was recalled by Premier Marshal Tito last Wednesday. Diplomatic relations between Yugoslavia and Greece still are maintained despite the envoy's departure.

Stephanopoulos said Monday that Rodionov had protested anti-Soviet articles in Greek newspapers and the banning of Russian films in certain Greek districts. When Cankar left Athens, he told Stephanopoulos his recall was prompted by attacks on Tito and on the Yugoslav government by sections of the Greek monarchist press.
