# LOOKING 'EM OVER

BY "TEC." FOUL PLAYING BY PUCKSTERS TO BE CURBED

In an effort to curb foul playing by hockeyists in the Maritimes, H. O. Schryer, president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, has issued the following warning from his association headquarters at Bathurst:

"All referees, coaches and players within the jurisdiction of the M. A. H. A. are warned that shoving, charging, body-checking and checking, of attacking players not in possession of the puck by opposing defencemen must stop. It has been a custom when two men come in on the attack that one defenceman takes the puck carrier and the other takes the loose attacker.

"In future any defending player who bodies, elbows, or lays a stick on an opponent not in possession of the puck will be sitting with the penalty timer. Players who deliberately make offside plays and kick the puck over the zone to stop play must be ruled off.

"Any player who carries a high stick is going to the penalty box, as are those who insist on hooking either an opponent or his stick."

## DETROIT 1 RANGERS WON AMERICANS 0 FROM CHI. 3-1

(Canadian Press) DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 27.—Detroit handed the New York Americans a 1 to 0 defeat in a National League hockey game here tonight.

## Pope Officiates In St. Peters

(By Andrus Berding, Associated Press Staff Writer) VATICAN CITY, Dec. 27.—Pope Pius personally officiated at Mass in St. Peter's today to commemorate the 1,500th anniversary of the Church Council of Ephesus.

The huge basilica was thronged with thousands of people of a dozen nationalities as the Pontiff was borne in on the sedia gestatoria, carried on the shoulders of twelve stalwart Vatican attendants in dark red.

Silver trumpets blown by six Swiss guards in a balcony over the principal door heralded his entrance and sounded the principal parts of the Mass. He was preceded by a number of prelates, marching in pairs, and by detachments of the Noble Guard and the Swiss Guard.

It was a low Mass without additional ceremony except that the Pope said special prayers at its conclusion.

## Huge Volumes Hold Petitions For Disarmament

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 25.—(By The Canadian Press)—Prime Minister R. B. Bennett will be presented with the Canada-wide disarmament petition during the week of January 11, it was announced here today.

In two volumes, each five feet high, the petition bears the signature of over 510,000 Canadians. Dr. H. M. Tory, President of the League of Nations in Canada will present the petition to the Prime Minister at a ceremony at the foot of the peace tower of the Parliament buildings.

# CAPITALS 5 ABEGWEITS 1

Looking like anything but losers in the opening period when they outshot Fredericton two to one and lead by one to nil score at the rest whistle, Abegweits showed a reversal of form in the remaining two sessions to be steam-rolled into a 5 to 1 defeat at the hands of their New Brunswick opponents on Christmas night.

The class that carried the red and black squad through three straight victories on the mainland was very much in evidence in the above mentioned first period, but the limit of human endurance can be reached, and this was no more clearly proven than in Friday night's contest.

Abegweits opened fast and furious, but after that one great effort for an early lead the pace soon took its toll, and Fredericton forwards sensing this slackening up in play, quickly grabbed the advantage of the break to rush in two unassisted goals in the first period and three more counters in final session, the last score, to cap all, being kicked into the cage from ten feet out.

On the score, Abies opened up a terrific offensive and tore in time and again over the Fredericton blue line, but "Daddy" Bubar was a Gibraltar that the locals could not hurdle.

Four minutes from the opening whistle, McManus, sturdy left alley Capital flash evened the score on a splendid solo effort. Still didn't have a chance on the close in sortie.

Four minutes later Gammon, Fredericton right winger put his team up front when he grabbed a loose puck outside the Abie blue line to coast in, also unassisted.

Gross was given two penalties and Oliver one in this period.

Three minutes from the face-off Mosher saddened the fans when he counted the third New Brunswick goal on a pass from McManus and four minutes from the above tally McArthur took a hand at counting on a pass from Beaton.

As an anti-climax, Fredericton made it 5 to 1 when Beaton took a pass from Mosher, carried the disc on his blade for six feet, lost it for a second, then carried it with his right skate to kick the unruly piece of vulcanite into the meshes behind Stull.

**THIRD OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES**  
BAND TONIGHT

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Dec. 25 — (A.P.)—Seventeen nations will compete in the third Olympic winter games here February 4 to 13, it was announced today by Dr. Godfrey Dewey, President of the Games Committee, following the close of the entry list last midnight.

The nations entered are Austria, Belgium, Canada, Czechoslovakia, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, Japan, Hungary, Norway, Poland, Roumania, Sweden, Switzerland and the United States.

More than 300 athletes representing these nations already are entered and the list will be increased materially before January 21, the closing date for individual entries.

Although economic conditions in Europe have in a few cases served to cut down the size of the visiting contingents, they have in no case cut down the quality of the competitors nor materially decreased the strength of the visiting teams. Virtually every winter sport star of Europe is entered.

The United States has the largest team and its 70 representatives will compete in all five of the major sports on the Olympic programme—Skating, speed skating, figure skating, hockey and bobsledding. They also will appear in the three demonstrations, sled dog racing, curling and women's speed skating.

Other large entry lists include Canada, 40; Germany, 35; Norway, 33; Sweden, 21; Switzerland, 20; Poland 20 and Japan 16.

With the exception of the Olympic arena, which will be completed by January 10, all of Lake Placid's Olympic facilities are now in use. They were built at a cost of over a half million dollars. There are 250 miles of ski trails.

## Toronto Leafs Turned Back 2 to Nil On Home Ice.

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 27. (By the Canadian Press)—A costly penalty which paved the way for a goal, started Montreal Canadiens on the path to an overtime 2 to 0 victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs in a speedy National Hockey League game Saturday night.

The leaders of the International section were without the service of their leading goal getter, Charlie Conacher, who injured his shoulder in Thursday night's game with Canadiens at Montreal and will probably be out until Jan. 5 with a wrenched ligament.

The break came in the first two minutes of the overtime period. Finigan was banished for an anti-defense infringement. Canadiens tore in on the attack and the flashing Morenz grabbed the puck at the right of the Toronto goal, circled around and came out in front of the net. He scored from about twenty feet out with a hard drive which was partly obscured from Chabot by the players in front of him.

The second Canadiens goal was anti-climax. Jollat broke away with LePine flanking him and only one defence man to beat. The tricky left winger slipped the puck to LePine as they swept in on the defender and LePine made no mistake with his shot.
