Mr. Gauthier is in charge of the loading and shipping of the foxes which will also be shipped to St. Pierre.

Canada, like other members of the British Commonwealth of nations, has no national flag of its own, and uses the British Union Jack as its official banner. Canadians have long wanted their own flag, and a 36-man Parliamentary committee has been examining new designs for many months. The 2800 ideas submitted have been winnowed down to five of those pictured above. (The sixth is Canada's present merchant flag, used on ships). From these five designs the committee will soon make a final choice. During the war the Canadian Active Service Forces adopted and flew a distinctive battle banner which many thought would become the national flag. Apparently it is out of the running.

Western Cattle Markets. Temporary suspension of the wholesale ceilings on red and blue brand beef served to boost prices on western cattle markets. WINNIPEG advanced 50 cents to \$1.25 and sold the better grades of slaughter steers of mixed weights at \$13 to \$14 on choice; and REGINA \$14.00.

Exports to United States. Shipments of dairy cattle to the United States in the past week amounted to 1977 head, making the total since January 18: 23,665.

Weekly Live Stock Market Review

Announcement was made of the temporary removal of the ceiling prices on red and blue brand beef. The prices were stepped up anywhere from 10 to 15 cents per cwt., with the major gains in the top grades. A much heavier volume of cattle was on hand at central markets but all were readily absorbed. The calf market continued firm, while hogs made notable gains at a number of markets, especially in the east; and lambs continued firm sellers.

Deliveries of cattle to stock yards and packing plants for the week were just under 24,000 head as compared with 26,000 in the previous week. Sales at the yards totalled 598,000, compared with 671,000 in the same period last year. Calf marketings for the week are 327,300 as against 281,000 last year, and sheep and lambs marketed 221,100 compared with 187,000 last year. Hog gradings for the week totalled 824,000 compared with 800,000 in the same week last year. Marketings from January 18 to date are slightly over 2,000,000 as compared with 1,982,000 in the same period last year.

Western Cattle Markets

Activity was more evident in the TORONTO cattle market during the week, and cattle prices moved substantially upward. While the run was heavier than in previous weeks, weighty steers and fed yearlings were 75 cents to \$1.00 higher and other classes were quoted at \$8 to \$9 for most of the week. REGINA was 25 cents to 50 cents higher, with the largest increase on the brandable quality. Best steers brought up to \$16.00.
