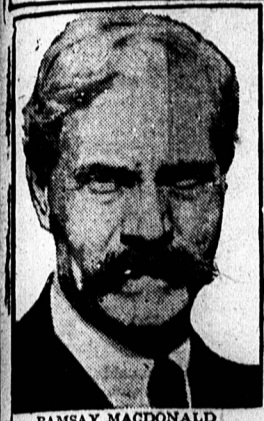

CHANCELLOR URGES WORLD CONFERENCE

To End "Dislocation" of Gold Reserves Which Has Piled Up 65 Percent of World's Supply in U. S. and France.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 22.—The beginning of "a new era" in world financial and political relations was predicted in international communique last night on the British Parliament's suspension of the gold standard. Closer cooperation to solve political financial problems including war debts, reparations, the distribution of gold and disarmament, was indicated by developments in London, Washington and Paris.

Chancellor of Exchequer Phillip Snowden speaking in the House of Commons and later on the radio, urged a world conference to end the "dislocation" of gold reserves which has piled up 65 per cent of the world's supply in the United States and France. A high authority in London forecast an international conference to readjust the world's post war financial network to meet the present critical conditions.

J. P. Morgan in London viewed optimistically the British action as another step in the right direction. In Paris the Government indicated its willingness to give whatever aid may be necessary to bolster Britain's position.

Resolution Is Defeated

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 22.—Backing the expressed view of their President, Tom Moore, delegates to the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada today voted down a resolution from the New Westminster Railway car men calling on the Dominion Government to resume diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia.

Action was taken in the face of lively opposition from a minority of some of whom criticized President Moore for his remarks at Toronto in commendation of the "Federal Government's action in closing Canadian Trade doors to certain Russian goods."

Work On Scenic Highway To Start

EDMONTON, Sept. 22.—Definite assurance that work is to start immediately on the scenic highway between Jasper and Banff has been given by Senator Gideon Robertson. One thousand of Albertas jobless, half of them from Edmonton, will be employed on the road.

UNCHANGED

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 22.—The Canadian dollar in the New York Exchange Market closed unchanged from its final figure yesterday of a seven percent discount, but at its highest point of the day. At the quotation of 93 cents in United States funds, the Canadian dollar was still at its lowest point since the post war years.

National Gov't For New Zealand

GANDHI GIVES HIS DOCTRINE TO THE WORLD

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Sept. 22.—New Zealand's National Government was constituted today to deal with the Dominion's financial and economic troubles. The new Ministry, which is equally representative of the United Party, which formed the last Government, and of the Reform Party, will have a substantial majority in the House of Representatives, only the small Labor Party being in opposition. SECOND LOAD GRAIN LEAVES CHURCHILL

Steamer Warkworth Bound For Unnamed Port With 268,000 Bushels of Wheat.

CHURCHILL, Man., Sept. 22.—Bound for an unnamed European port with a cargo of wheat, the steamer Warkworth sailed from this port this afternoon. The Warkworth pushed out into the Hudson Bay at 3.35 p. m. (C. S. T.)

The second of the two vessels carrying the test shipment of 800,000 bushels of wheat over the Hudson Bay route, contained 268,000 bushels of wheat. The first ship, the Farnworth, sailed Friday for London and is now making good progress through Hudson Strait.

Although the Warkworth's cargo of wheat has been sold, the destination of the ship has not been decided. Further orders will be given the ship by radio when it is off the coast of Ireland.

Canada Will Take Over Royal Mint

Action Taken With A View To Strengthening Gold Position In Dominion—Drop In Value Of Canadian Dollar Only Nominal.

(Special to the Guardian)
OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—Implementing legislation passed at the last session of Parliament, Canada will shortly take over the royal mint here. For several weeks officials of the Finance Department have been in touch with Canadian mines arranging for supplies of gold bullion to be used in the operation of the mint. While this action was not taken with a view to meeting an emergency situation, it is stated at the Department that its effect will probably be to strengthen the gold position here.

No embargo on gold shipments from Canada exists and no intimation has been given of the placing of such an embargo. Departmental officials stated this morning that they had no knowledge of conferences on the value of the Canadian dollar in New York.

DROP ONLY NOMINAL

The drop in the value of the Canadian dollar is purely nominal, according to J. A. McLeod, Vice President General Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia. There is no cause for alarm in the situation he said here today. The decline of the dollar is "a repercussion of the disordered state of international finance. When people regain their poise within the next few days, everything will be all right."

Bessborough Baby Christened

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 21.—Without pomp or pretentious ceremony, the infant son of Their Excellencies the Governor General and Lady Bessborough, was christened this afternoon in the little church of Saint Bartholomew where his God father, His Majesty the King, had worshipped when in Canada.

Overcast skies and a drizzle of rain pervaded throughout the ceremony, which lasted less than half an hour. Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden, former Prime Minister of Canada, stood for His Majesty as the child was baptized George St. Lawrence Neufville.

Law Will Take Its Course

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22.—The law will take its course in the case of John Brokenshire sentenced to die in Toronto this morning. Brokenshire was convicted for the murder of constable Roy McQuillin of the Toronto police department.

Wall Street Applauds Action Of British Govt.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Partial suspension of gold payments by the Bank of England was applauded in High Wall street banking circles today as a constructive measure, dictated by an emergency situation. It was pointed out that the suspension does not affect the recent loans to Great Britain by the Federal Reserve and the private banking syndicate, since these loans are specifically payable in gold dollars. Neither does it affect the service on the bulk of British dollar bonds held in this country since they are specifically payable, both as to principal and interest in gold dollars.

CH'TOWN FROM THE AIR

As Seen By Guardian Representatives Yesterday Afternoon—Truly A Beautiful Sight.
