

GARLIC FOR HARDENED ARTERIES IS THE LATEST FREAK OF SCIENCE

Discovery Made by French Physicians and Reported to Biological Society Dealers Root Can be Either Chewed Eaten With Salads or Steeped in Spirits.

PARIS, Aug. 25.—Garlic munching may become a habit of elderly people who are threatened with hardening of the arteries, if there is any virtue in a discovery just made by three famous French physicians.

A report by the doctors to the Biological Society declares that garlic supplies a valuable remedy for arterial tension. The root can

be either chewed, eaten with salads or steeped in spirits. It used with the spirits it is allowed to steep for three weeks and then injected in travenously at the rate of thirty drops daily.

Many experiments have shown that a week's treatment reduces the blood pressure to practically normal.

MUST STOP PRINTING PAPER MONEY IF SHE IS TO AVOID BANKRUPTCY

Another Year of the Presses and all Europe Will Have Paper Money Which Can Never be Redeemed, Declares English Economist.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—"If Europe's pre-war wealth which was shot away during the war. bankruptcy, two things are essential: she must have gold and she must stop printing paper money. change should be given gold in order to 'peg' her exchanges. By this means the flow of goods and credits could be restarted. In the end it would pay America handsomely. "Will America act? If not, she will find her European trade killed, and both Great Britain and America growing poorer and poorer. "America has made a colossal financial mistake. Unless we are all to become involved in the most shattering disaster in history, gold must be used to adjust our broken economic mechanism. "Then we will have automatic Bolshevism, collapse, revolution, and night-mare. "Only America can prevent this tragedy. At the present time her gold is no good to her; whereas, if given to Europe, it would enable Europe to buy and America to sell. That is the only way to rebuild done quickly to avert the crash."
