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Grand total under both agreements—428 students. Of these, 150 were from the rural communities. "Not all our students are here today," Dr. Shaw said, "they are of course, at work throughout the province. It is our duty to say to this representative group that the student body acquitted themselves well. They have been faithful in attendance at classes and in doing the required work. Now we would congratulate you on finishing what we should like you to consider as the preliminary stages of your training. I should like to say, too, that the future of our new institution such as the Vocational Wing depends very largely on the success of the graduates. We have not yet heard that any students have let us down. We would ask you to go out to your various activities to maintain the high standard that we are seeking to develop.

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The Supervisor acknowledged the splendid co-operation received from the officials of the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture, the Experimental Farm, the Division of Science, the Provincial Department of Health, the Red Cross Society and Messrs. McLean and Leighton of the staff of Prince of Wales College, also of the National Film Board which provided visual aid in the form of agricultural films, thus adding much to the interest and value of the course. From April 4th to April 11th a course in "Practical Farming" was conducted. The interest and attendance was quite gratifying. Over fifty persons registered, the daily classes being from forty to sixty. Instruction was given by Dr. George C. Bishop, Dr. Joseph Akin, Director of Provincial Veterinary Services, New Brunswick, Ralph McLean, H. W. Clay and Louis Bejeau of the Experimental Farm, Summerside. "The lack of interest in agricultural short courses in this Province," Dr. Dewar stated, "is as this form of instruction may be indicated the necessity of developing a more general interest in agricultural instruction, both in our rural schools and among all age groups."

Mr. Dewar suggested that a series of correspondence lessons, prepared and edited by qualified persons, could be popularized with the aid of existing study groups and the various agricultural organizations existing in the Province. These correspondence lessons of a practical nature, might then be used as the basis of instruction in our rural schools. The possibility exists that in many parts of the province night schools could be developed, and where leaders in these schools could be given instruction

Therefore, the first and most important problem confronting the agricultural educationalist is the necessity of dignifying agriculture in the minds of those engaged in it. Secondly, the
