—THE BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA, Montague, will occupy temporary offices next door Dr. McIntyre's residence until completion of new building.

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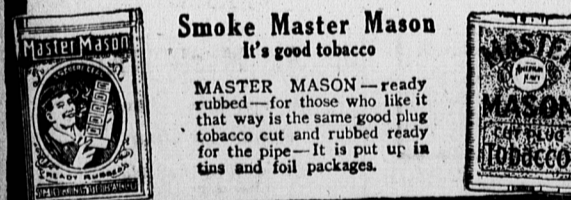
