TORN FROM YOUNG BRIDE ON STEAMER.

HALIFAX, April 7.—Pleford and Black have been advised that the United Fruit Company's liner San Benito which is in command of Captain Daniel M. McDonald of Halifax left Boston Wednesday for this port.

Quite a commotion was caused at Boston upon the arrival of the San Benito, on Sunday when First Sergeant Alden D. Ball of the U.S. Engineers, who claims he is the sole heir to a large estate on Park Avenue New York, was arrested and placed under armed guard when he and his pretty young bride arrived on board the San Benito.

Ball was charged with desertion, forging discharge papers, and absconding with the funds of the post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in the Canal zone. His wife clung frantically to him and sobbingly pleaded with his guards to release him as he was marched aboard a tug and sent down the harbor to the prison at Fort Strang.

The army officials at Coro-San in the Canal zone charged that Ball had married the girl—said to have been a member of a Broadway chorus until she went to Panama to marry Ball—and that they had lived happily for two months when Ball took absence without leave. With him and the bride on the San Benito went the funds of Post No. 40 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars which is charged. It is also alleged that Ball forged discharge papers on stolen forms.

Ball insisted that "a terrible mistake had been made", and that the army officials had arrested the wrong man.

POINCARÉ EXACTING STRICTEST ECONOMY

LONDON, April 8.—French Ministers plenipotentiary at the new Lausanne conference will be allowed a bottle of wine with their meals, secretaries of legation and other secondary officials half a bottle, and clerks, typists, etc. will have to pay for their own.

It is to be in the interest of economy, premier Poincaré objected to holding the conference in Switzerland because of the expense. He was withdrawn his objection but he has laid down strict rules for his delegates in the interest of economy.

If they even sleep comfortably on the way to Lausanne, they will have to pay for the privilege themselves. First class fares are allowed each member of the French contingent, but sleeping car accommodations and any other extras will not be paid by the Government.

DIVORCE COURT SAVED TWENTY WORKING DAYS

LONDON, April 8.—Nearly five hundred divorce actions have been filed at the country realizes since the new system was inaugurated six months ago of permitting trials outside London. It is estimated that the London Divorce Court has been relieved to the extent of twenty working days by the new arrangement, which has also meant a considerable saving to the applicants in the provinces, many of whom are soldiers and in poor financial circumstances.

A coterie of London lawyers used to make rather a snug income out of this business, charging probably ten guineas a case. Many hundred guineas therefore have gone west or rather north, for Manchester and Liverpool have contributed the largest number of cases.

MINISTER TO PROBE BECK STORY

OTTAWA, April 8.—A Toronto paper published an interview today with Frederick Beck, an official of the Swiss Government, who reached Toronto with a party of Swiss emigrants, in which he complains bitterly of the system of reception and distribution adopted by the Canadian Immigration authorities, which he says is absolutely unworkable and impracticable.

The party with him, he claims, is the advance guard of 20,000 experienced farmers whom the Swiss Government is anxious to help to come to Canada; but he now avers that his Government must proceed with caution in sending men to this country. Immigration officials seemed to be suspicious as to the past military service of men in Switzerland, all of which they denied. Two of them said they had been subjected to a severe grilling at Halifax as to their past military service.

LECTURES PERLEY WITHOUT COMMENT REPORTS OF THE OTTAWA DEBATE, IN WHICH THE IMMIGRATION SCHEME WAS SUBJECTED TO CRITICISM.

LONDON, April 8.—The London Daily Herald, mouthpiece of the Labor party, says Sir George Perley, former Canadian High Commissioner in London for having, on landing at Liverpool this week from Canada, declared that "no country is getting along better than Canada"; that "very few are out of work there"; and "there is room and work for millions on the land."

Sir George made these remarks in a casual way to reporters on landing. The Herald, however, divines that Perley "evidently means to push with all his energy the scheme for sending people from the British Isles to Canada."

The paper proceeds to give extracts of a recent debate in the Canadian Federal House showing considerable opposition to the overseas settlement scheme. Finally, the Herald "expects the representative of the Dominion to hold the balance evenly instead of taking rosy views, which are not justified."

The Labor organ apparently is unaware that Perley now holds no official position, and is here merely on a holiday.

Several other papers publish without comment reports of the Ottawa debate, in which the immigration scheme was subjected to criticism.

"MUST LEARN OR PERISH," SAYS LORD ROBT. CECIL

NEW YORK, April 8.—"We must, as nations, either learn or perish," declared Lord Robert Cecil here tonight in the first of his addresses on behalf of the League of Nations. He declared that despite all that has happened since the war toward disarmament and in an endeavor to check the possible frightfulness of another war, the menace of death hangs over the world so long as nations stand armed against one another. There are many among the nations, even as among those added to it, who are determined to maintain, driven by the demands of fear and suspicion.

The only safety will lie in co-operation and in effect disarmament there must be an international co-operation, Lord Robert believed, for in the present state of affairs communication is inevitable. This co-operation, he said, can best come through the medium of

SYDNEY, April 8.—All the witnesses at the preliminary hearing of six alleged strike pickets here today agreed that they saw large crowds of men taking mattresses and mixed freight on the evening of February 15, during the Sydney steel strike, not one of them could identify any of the accused as having been in the crowd.

At Chipman, Eddie Davis, Robert Clark, William Laughlin, William Ryan and Jack White were the alleged pickets before the court, charged with stealing from a Sydney and Louisburg Railway car on the Steel Company's property.

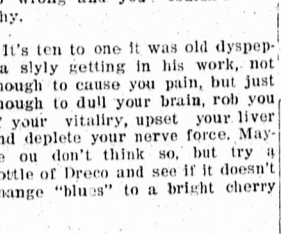
