Living in a cottage on the wild Cornish coast, about two miles from St. Ives, England, is a remarkable eighty-year old woman, Granny Ashton, who has just celebrated the diamond jubilee of her wedding. She is famed throughout Cornwall as the woman with the magic hands, and claims to have cured 900 patients of all ailments and diseases ranging from paralysis to ticdouloureux. In addition to her healing powers, Granny Ashton is a water finder. "Some people refuse to shake hands with me, saying that I give them an electric shock," said Granny Ashton to a reporter. "I discovered my power to heal shortly after I found that I could find water. I came across a gangster on the line suffering from a severe attack of neuralgia. I said, 'Come here and let me rub it.' I ran my fingers over the aching part and the pain vanished. The gangster told his mates, and whenever a railwayman had any pain he came to me, I've been knocked up by railwaymen in the middle of the night to cure their pains. "After a while people suffering from other maladies started to come to me. During the last years of the war I worked seventeen hours a day attending soldiers and sailors who sought my help. One of the most remarkable cases was a young man named Dan Scully. He was playing football at Bodmin, and was kicked on the knee. Tuberculosis set in and Scully was sent to Margate to have his leg amputated.
