**ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST**

THE annual horse trot will take place on Pinette ice on Saturday, March 26 at two p. m. By order of committee.—Duncan Buchan.

A CHILREN reports that two years ago last Saturday bulbs were in bloom in his garden. The winter of 1902 was as mild as this one was severe.

THE death occurred in Rovers, Mass., on March 11 of Mrs. Sarah McCormack, wife of James McCormack, aged 51 years, formerly of P. E. Island.

THE winter steamers made good crossings on Saturday though the ice was reported somewhat more tightly packed. The mail reached the city at 3.10.

The chapel was filled at all the services during the day.

THE adjourned case against John McKenna, Water Street, was concluded at the Police Court, Saturday, by the case being dismissed. A large number of new witnesses were examined but no new evidence was adduced that would prove the charge of keeping a disorderly house. The magistrate in giving judgment, however, said the evidence was such as fully justified the Marshal in taking the action which he had. The Magistrate also said that there was no doubt but that the place was a common nuisance and as such might be proceeded against under the common law. He closed by giving salutary advice to the prisoner and instructed the Marshal that if there were reasonable evidence of this, or any other like house in the city being of such a nature as charged in this case that the Marshal have a search warrant issued, and the inmates arrested.

THE concert at Vernon River held on St. Patrick's night under the auspices of the O. M. B. A. was a decided success. As the night was fine and the roads good, the spacious hall was crowded long before the appointed hour with an eager and expectant audience. The program which consisted of choruses by the Glee Club, solos by Miss Eliza O'Neil and John Green, and readings by the Misses Walsh and Beers and Alex. Irving, was carried out in its entirety. Although each number was faultless and received enthusiastic accolades, yet special mention must be made of the solo by Miss Eliza O'Neil whose magnificent voice was heard to great advantage in that old ballad "Kathleen Mavourneen". The oration for the occasion was delivered by P. J. Trainor, one of Charlottetown's rising young lawyers. After saying that the anniversary of St. Patrick's was one which was celebrated not to awaken racial animosity nor to keep alive sectarian differences but rather having for its object the unification of the different races which make up this Canada of ours and the cultivation of a more tolerant spirit, the learned speaker went on to say that this commemorative was an event which should be looked upon with pleasure and reverence not only by persons whose descent from old Erin but should be dear to the heart of every Christian. With an exuberance of thought which evinced a careful study of the subject and with splendor of diction which showed the excellent scholarship of the speaker, he traced the life of the patron Saint of Ireland, and showed how his life and labors had been beneficial to the world in general. He quoted extensively from Moore and other writers, describing the important part played by Ireland in the building of the British nation and showed how they had manfully taken their part in that great struggle for responsible Government. Mr. Trainor's delivery is forcible without being declamatory, his address has conciseness, his diction, scholarly without pedantry. At the close of the concert the chairman Rev. Dr. Doyle, announced that at no distant date the people of Vernon River would have the pleasure of listening to Professor Caven's admirable lecture on Tam O'Shanter.
