BREAKING THE LABOR STRIKE

FELL FROM MAST OVER SIXTY FEET

To Schooler's Deck--Sad Fate of Swedish Sailor in Saint John.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 10--(Special)--After falling over sixty feet from a mast head on the schooner Abbie, C. Stubbs, lying at head of Hare's wharf, Albert Fustifson, a Swede, was picked up unconscious and shortly afterwards died at the Public Hospital from injuries received.

The sailor had climbed to a spar at the mast head and was fastening the topsail when the accident occurred. Nobody was watching him at the time, but suddenly a cry was heard and the unfortunate man's body was seen falling through space.

He tumbled over in the fall and alighted on a winch which was stationed at the bottom of the mast. He fell across this on his right side and when several of the crew reached him he was unconscious.

IN COLLISION AT GALVESTON

Engineer and Porter Met Their Death and Passengers Were Injured.

GALVESTON, TEXAS, Aug. 10--(Special)--In rear end-on collision last night between passenger trains of the Missouri, Kansas, and Texas and International and Great Northern railways which occurred at the Galveston end of the Bay bridge, Engineer Rothenburg on the International and Great Northern train was killed and a negro porter named Reberry was fatally hurt.

A number of passengers suffered slight injuries.

SCOTTISH GAMES AT SUMMERSIDE

Races Opened by Governor McKinnon, Large Number Of Sports Held.

SUMMERSIDE, August 10.--The annual gathering of the clans was held on the grounds of the Summerside Driving Park and Exhibition Co., at Summerside yesterday. The day was an ideal one for the gathering, the town being crowded by people from all parts of the Province.

The first train from the east which arrived about 11.15 brought twelve carloads of people, the second from Murray Harbor which arrived about fifteen minutes later brought eight carloads more and the special from the west had ten cars crowded to the doors, besides which the regular trains from both east and west brought large crowds.

The gathering was an orderly one and carried on without any disorderly conduct being noticed. On the arrival of the first special from Charlottetown the members of the Caledonia club headed by the pipers and the Fourth Regiment Band formed in procession and marched to the grounds.

The attendance at the games in the afternoon was the largest in the Province in the history of the Club, it being estimated that there were about 3500 people in attendance. The different events were keenly contested and carried out without much delay.

After the dancing competition was finished, Master Lawrence McLaren, son of J. S. McLaren, inspector of customs, in the costume of the St. Stephen cadet, St. John, N. B., gave an exhibition of dancing in the Ghillie Callum and Highland Fling, which came in for much applause. He was marched on and off the field by piper John Gibson of St. John, who received great applause during the afternoon for his mastery rendition of selections on the pipes, especially his selection of Stretch Sebys Reels and Waltz's.

Master McLaren also received much applause for his different selections on the pipes given by him in front of the grand stand during the afternoon. Master McLaren was also the winner of the club's medal for the best Highland costume on the grounds.

AGED VETERAN DIES IN PRISON

Was Left Homeless and Friendless. Then Sent to Jail as a Vagrant.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Aug. 10.--(Special)--Wm. Parker, eighty years old, a veteran of the Crimean War, died in the district jail here on Saturday.

He was homeless and friendless, and being unable to work was committed as a vagrant. The jury which enquired into his death returned a verdict that death was from internal causes and recommended that the Government provide a home in Northern Ontario where old and homeless men would be taken care of without having to end their lives behind prison bars.

NINE KILLED MANY INJURED

Railway Collision in Germany, Empty Cars in Way of Express Train

ECKARNFORDE, GERMANY, Aug. 10--(Special)--Nine persons were killed and many injured this morning in a collision between a passenger train and a train of empty cars on a branch line running between Flensburg and Kiel.

The dead and injured were residents of towns along the line. A meeting of the city council was held last night with His Worship the Mayor and Councillors Rogers, Ripley, Johnson, Reddin and Lane present.

The following resolution was moved by Coun. Rogers and seconded by Coun. Reddin, whereas it has pleased Almighty God in His Wisdom to remove from our midst the late D. L. Hooper, who for twelve years occupied a seat at this board. Therefore resolved: That the sympathy of His Worship the Mayor and City Councillors be tendered Mrs. Hooper and family in their bereavement.

And further resolved: That a copy of this resolution be engrossed on the minutes of the City Council and another copy be sent to the family of the deceased.

The resolution was carried by a standing vote. Feeling reference to the late Mr. Hooper was made by His Worship the Mayor and members of the council.

The following resolution was moved by Coun. Rogers and seconded by Coun. Ripley. Resolved: That in future all supplies purchased by the city shall be by requisition signed by the city clerk, such requisition to be attached to all statements rendered, and further resolved, that the city clerk insert a notice in the city papers in reference to the above. Council adjourned.
