B. to attend the exhibition there. Mr. Logan will be in charge of the egg candling demonstration and Mr. Curran will assist Mr. G. R. Wilson with the poultry division exhibit.

AGRICULTURAL MEETING.—Mr. J. K. King live stock representative of Moncton, N.B. and Mr. W. L. Reid, Director Agricultural Instruction of the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, addressed a farmers meeting in Summerfield Hall on Wednesday evening Aug. 25th, on co-operative marketing of live stock. Mr. King's address was very clear and instructive showing the benefits that the farmers of New Brunswick are now deriving from the marketing of their stock co-operatively. Mr. Reid gave some very helpful information on raising and preparing for the market as well as the shipping of the stock. A number of the farmers present expressed their approval of this system of marketing and it was decided that those who wished to market their stock co-operatively should give to the Manager of the operation, the Farmers' Ltd., Enfield an account of what stock they have for sale and when it will be ready.

A BEAUTIFUL INSTRUMENT.—Probably the most beautiful musical instrument ever seen in Charlottetown is the Columbia Grafonola now on exhibition in one of the show windows of Mr. A. E. Toombs music store on Queen Street and which is to be given as a third prize in the Guardian and Examiners' Contest. This instrument is fitted in a magnificent cabinet of rich dark oak, hand carved in 18th century small Gothic design and exquisitely finished. A feeling of the ancient Italian architecture runs through the design. The tripod symbolic of the Holy Trinity the quartet representing the four evangelists with a faint resemblance of the Cross, symbol of the crucifixion, all making a combination of intense interest as well as beauty. The musical equipment is of the most modern type, electrically and automatically started and stopped. All the metal parts are antique silver. The cabinet stands about 24 inches high and one foot seven inches in width and depth. As a piece of furniture alone it is magnificent and as a musical instrument it is the finest ever imported here. It is certainly a prize worth working hard for and the winner may well consider any labor given to it well rewarded.

OUR POULTRY IMPROVING.—Mr. Cyrus Poirier of the Live Stock Branch, Poultry Division states that fifty-four poultry raising demonstrations were held in this Province this year. He reports that the poultry outlook on the island is decidedly encouraging and that farmers are taking a lively interest in improving their flocks. There has been quite an increase this year in the number of poultry raised besides what was supplied by the hatchery operated by Canadian Farm Products. The stock looks exceedingly good everywhere and more attention is being paid for breeding. The heaviest birds selected from pure-bred flocks and the eggs are all from inspected flocks. There is a great improvement in the year-old hens. It is pointed out that now is the time the flocks should be culled and the unprofitable birds done away with.

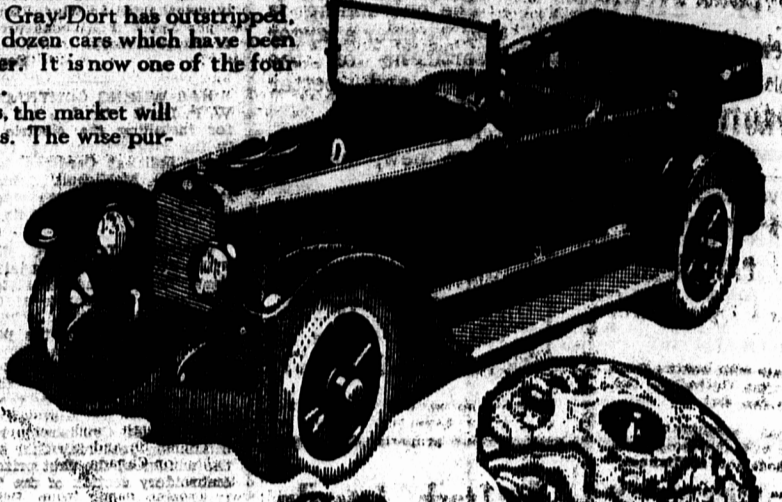

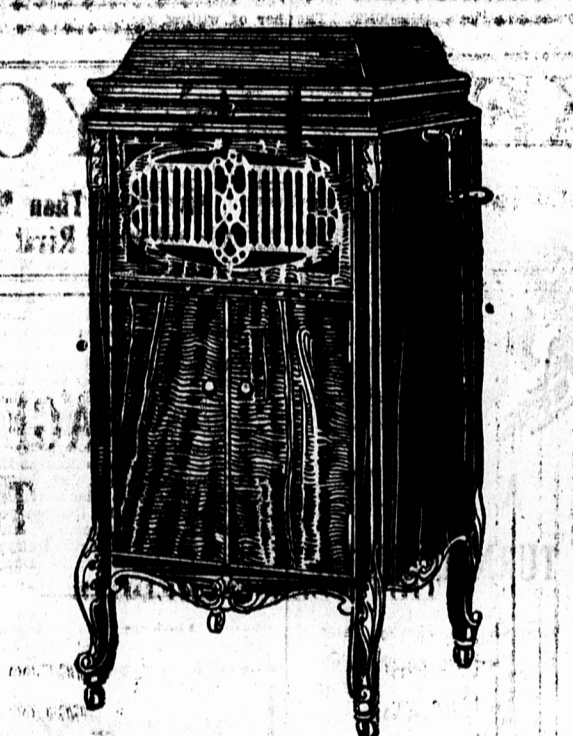
