\$100,000 Tax Refund For P.E.I.

OTTAWA, Feb. 13. — The Honorable Dr. J. J. McCann, Minister of National Revenue, announced today that approximately \$53,000,000 will be paid out in refunds to individual taxpayers as they file their 1949 Income Tax returns. The refunds will go out to over 2,000,000 taxpayers who overpaid their taxes for the first three months of 1949, prior to submission of the Budget to Parliament. The refunds cannot be computed and made until taxpayers have filed their 1949 returns. The drive launched last year by the Taxation Division has succeeded in disposing of nearly all outstanding assessments for 1948 and prior years. Thus, the decks have been cleared for the flow of 1949 returns and claims for 1949 refunds will be dealt with promptly after the returns have been filed. It is estimated that refunds will be claimed somewhat as follows: Ontario \$23,900,000; Quebec \$12,600,000; British Columbia \$7,000,000; Manitoba \$2,900,000; Alberta \$2,800,000; Saskatchewan \$1,800,000; Nova Scotia \$1,700,000; New Brunswick \$1,200,000; Prince Ed-

Jubilee Tea Commemorates IODE 50th Anniversary

At Government House yesterday afternoon members of three I.O.D.E. chapters met to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the organization in Canada. The first Chapter of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire was in Montreal, Quebec, and during the past fifty years the order has made steady progress and now has members in Canada from Prince Edward Island to the Yukon of more than 32,000 women in 930 Chapters. A brief program was given to review the history of Charlottetown groups, by three regents, Mrs. William Brehaut of the Royal Edward Chapter, Mrs. Arthur Roper of the Earl of Hillsborough Chapter and Mrs. Ralph Dumont of the L.M. Montgomery Chapter.

Mrs. Brehaut's Address

"Sometimes solemn ceremonies such as anniversaries seem sad but there is a quality of deep and quiet happiness mingled with the solemnity of our ceremony today," said Mrs. Brehaut. "Today we pay tribute to wise leadership of former members of our Order, and with our expression of old memories and old loyalties, we also reaffirm our faith and hope in the future. "Edify women, the mothers of men, the Daughters of the Empire build for the future on the sure and solid foundations of the past, casting out loose, outworn stones and replacing mortar where necessary. In a land as young as ours, such a group of women, dedicated to set and maintain standards in every phase of national life, is to quote the Bishop of B.C. — indispensable. It is wise and loving to cheer their broken in mind and body who lie in military hospitals so that every vestige of human worth may be saved and nurtured. So also is it good to feed and clothe those deprived of life's necessities by war. Yet all this will not save the future. "With sure realism the Order has seen that in educating the debt to those who pay the evil chance of war was prevented from living out their normal span in service to their country and the Empire. Only in education lies the ultimate hope of preventing the brutality of war in the future, and of realizing the full potentialities of Canada in peace. "Had the Daughters of the Empire accomplished none of their other many and splendid services, other than that of the Order's existence would be justified by the establishment of the First and Second War Memorials and the results they have accomplished. They could have chosen no surer means of perpetuating and protecting the standards they hold dear. The bright banner of learning shall be carried forward in the strong hands of I.O.D.E. scholars, their knowledge shall cause our standards to glow in the dark places of the future."

Churchill Makes The Welsh Laugh

CARDIFF, Feb. 13 — Now making the strongest comeback effort in their history in this principal paragraph of his speech alone evoked loud laughs. He was talking about the jargon of Socialism—"lower income group" instead of the poor and "arresting increases in per capita income" instead of "wage freezing." "There is a lovely one about houses and homes," he con in ed "they are in future to be called 'accommodation units' I don't know how we are to sing our old song 'Home Sweet Home'." His audience roared and Churchill dutifully recited "Accommoda-

tion unit. Sweet accommodation unit, there's no place like our accommodation unit."

His impish smile turned grim and his audience gave its wildest cheer when he said: "I hope to live to see the British democracy spit all this rubbish from their lips. Mr. Churchill began his speech with the "True Story of Tony-pandy"—how he stopped the movement of troops to the Rhonda Valley when there was rioting and looting and sent instead 850 London policemen armed only with their rolled up raincoats.

Challenging a statement by Herbert Morrison, Lord President of the Council, that the period between the wars "was paradise for the profiteers and hell for everyone else," Mr. Churchill asserted that on the contrary "these years were a period of hitherto unprecedented expansion and progress."

He cited the building of homes, lowering of working hours, improvement of children's welfare services, a rise in wages, a fall in the cost of living and an increase in the value of the pound which the Labor Government devalued last year.

"There was a steady improvement in the food of the people and a marked increase in the consumption of milk, cheese, butter and eggs and of fruit and vegetables," he said.

His audience, whose basic food is still rationed, laughed when he added "I don't want to make your mouths water."

TRIAL TO PROCEED

QUEBEC, Feb. 13 — (CP) — A defence request for postponement of the trial of J. Albert Guay, accused of murder in connection with the time-bomb destruction of a Quebec Airways plane last September, was refused today by Mr. Justice Albert Sevigny. Bertrand Marcotte, counsel for the 28-year-old Quebec jeweller specifically charged with the murder of his wife sought the postponement on the ground Provincial Police "indictments" had created prejudice against Guay. Mr. Justice Sevigny accepted a request by Crown authorities that the trial proceed Feb. 23.
