S' Side Town Council Meet

SUMMERSIDE, Nov. 12.—The
regular monthly meeting of the
Summerside Town Council was held
last night with His Worship Mayor
Lidstone presiding over a full coun-
cil Board. After the reading of the
minutes of last month's two meet-
ings, accounts amounting to \$4,983.98
were passed. Two communications
were read from Mr. Hallett, man-
ager of the new plant now being
erected at S' Side by Central Creamer-
ies Ltd. of Charlottetown, in which it
was stated that the new factory would
be known as the Perfection Dairy
Company and it was hoped to have
the plant in operation on Jan. 1st
next. One communication was a re-
quest for a permit to place a boiler
in the new factory, which was grant-
ed on motion of Councillor Moore.
The other stated that the Perfection
Dairy Co., on the completion of
their plant proposed to supply
Summerside customers with pas-
teurized milk. For this purpose ap-
plication was made for a milk ven-
dors license. After a short discussion
the matter was referred to the Rec-
order to amend the existing by law so
as to cover the sale of pasteurized
milk. Councillor Moore submitted
the Police Report for the month,
which was approved and moved that
Mr. Joseph B. Linkletter be appoint-
ed a regular police officer for the
Town at a salary of \$80 per month
after quite a lively debate in which
conditions at Summerside regard-
ing corner loafing etc came in for
considerable comment. Councillor
Schurman moved an amendment that
the matter be laid over to the next
meeting of the council. The amend-
ment carried, only Councillor Moore
dissenting. Councillor Schurman
submitted the engineers report of the
output and working of the electric
plant for last month and a requisition for needed supplies at the plant
which was approved and filed. It was
moved by Councillor Schurman that
the managing engineer of the electric
light plant be instructed to connect
up Mr. James H. Prichard's fox
ranch on Duke St. also that the Mayor
and Town Clerk be authorized to
sign a contract for Laco Mazda
lamps. Both motions were carried
unanimously. After some discussion
on electric matters, Council adjourn-
ed to meet next Friday night to in-
vestigate police matters.

FINANCE
(Continued from Page 1)

Minister of Finance
In 1924 came the step in his career
which was to make the name of
Robb known throughout Canada.

Teens he went to learn the milling
trade at his uncle's mill in Valley-
field. Mr. Robb was barely twenty
when the uncle was killed by an ac-
cident in the mill and the widow,
Mrs. McDonald took the young man
into partnership with her, forming
the firm of McDonald and Robb.

Under his presidency the business
flourished for many years. In 1926
a fire destroyed the plant but it
was rebuilt along model lines and is
regarded as the best equipped of the
small mills of Canada.

In September, 1899, James Robb
married Mary Alma Wattie, the
daughter of a well known eastern
country family. Mrs. Robb died in
1902. An only daughter, Janet, was
married in 1916 to Hugh H. Donald
of Toronto. She died in 1918. Mr.
Robb was married a second time in
1920 to Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Wattie,
of Maple Bay, British Columbia.

First Contact With Public Life
It was in the city of Valleyfield
that Mr. Robb first established con-
tact with public life. His success in
business impressed those interested
in the civic affairs of the commu-
nity, and as the result of public
petition he became mayor in 1906.

In two years he pulled the city out
of a bad financial position and set
civic affairs on a smooth plane. It
was his vigorous actions that ulti-
mately secured pavement for a city
situated in a rich lumber district
at a time when planks were consid-
ered the only safe covering for mud
streets. He remained mayor of the
city until 1910.

In 1908 Sir Wilfred Laurier select-
ed Mr. Robb as the most suitable
Liberal candidate to contest the con-
stituency of Huntingdon. His op-
ponent, R. N. Walsh, was the first
Conservative who had represented
the constituency since Confederation
but Mr. Robb won by the narrow
margin of 80 votes.

It is rather unusual that Chateau-
eau-Huntingdon, (as it is now called)
has never claimed Mr. Robb as a
resident except for the years of
his boyhood. His home has always
been in Valleyfield in Beauharnois
county. He was returned to the
House of Commons at all of the
following six general elections, as
well as by-elections in 1921 and 1926,
with majorities ranging up to 1800.

For nearly 10 years, Mr. Robb was
an admitted "back bencher." He
was quietly popular among his fellow
members, but no one ever regarded
him as one of the inevitably "mark-
eted men" whom politicians and the
press are constantly selecting as suc-
cessors to the great. After the war
time election in 1917, Mr. Robb was
elected chief Opposition Whip for
the Liberal Party. His success at this
post led Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie
King to take him into the newly
formed Liberal government of 1921
as Minister of Trade and Commerce.

Thus cabinet rank came after 13
years in parliament as a private
member.

Mr. Robb's term as Minister of
Trade and Commerce was notable
chiefly for the promotion of young-
sters. There were several instances
of youth being put to the front
in departmental affairs. He did not
have the department long, for in
1923 he took over the strenuous port-

folios of Immigration and Coloniza-
tion.

The Minister of Finance was not
amongst the first rank of orators.
His budget speeches were rather
famous for their brevity, being often
compared to a president's address to
his shareholders. In election cam-
paigns, Mr. Robb was perhaps more
effective than in the House. But
both in the House and out the
Minister was always sure of a respect-
ful hearing, due to the deep personal
regard in which he was held on
all sides. During the elections since
1925 he found a fighting partner in
Hon. Charles Dunning, Minister of
Railways. These two, who were desk
mates on the Government front
benches, toured Canada together on
several occasions and were regarded
as a most effective campaign team.

Travel was the Minister's great-
est diversion. His life had been too
crowded with business and public
service to allow time for many sports
but in travelling at sea he found
complete contentment. In 1923 he
made a trip around the world on
official business and among other
matters he negotiated the famous
Australian trade treaty which was
later a storm centre in parliament.

Later he took brief trips abroad for
relaxation. One of his proudest pos-
sessions was his membership card in
the Commercial Travellers Associa-
tion. The annual dinner of this
association and the annual dinner of
the Bell Telephone Company were
the two yearly functions that Mr.
Robb never missed, the latter be-
cause Mr. Robb, as a boy, had been
the first telephone operator in Val-

Mr. Robb was always reluctant to
accept honors, but he made an ex-
ception in favor of Queen's Univer-

red on him the honorary degree of
L. L. D.

J. A. Robb out of respect for the
wishes of the bereaved wife of the
late Minister of Finance. His re-
mains will be laid at rest with simple
and private ceremony in the family

chiefly for the promotion of young-
sters. There were several instances
