ing to the intense bombardment. He walked back to the dressing station, where his wound was dressed by Chap. Capt. Khuring, who recently returned to St. John.

He was in several hospitals in France and England. His eye was removed in the Boulogne Hospital, and he underwent two operations in England, the final one being performed in the Western Canada Eye and Ear Hospital at Folkestone.

He is now attached to the B Unit of the Medical Hospital Commission, with headquarters at Halifax. He will remain home for a while before reporting to the Medical Board.

Private Daniel Nicholson of Head of Montague, spent two years at the front with the Army Medical Corps and returned after his strenuous experience to resume his medical studies. He left by the afternoon train on Saturday for his home.
